

YANKKEES TAKE NEEDED GAME

American Pennant Nabbed in Home of Opposing Forces

Merely Coincidence That Team Should Win Honors in Same City Where Opponents Took First Prize

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 25.—(United Press)—The New York Yankees clinched the American league pennant for 1926 today by defeating the St. Louis Browns in a double-header.

It was a coincidence that the Yanks should clinch the pennant in the home city of their opponent, the St. Louis Cards who yesterday won the National league title.

Despite that Cleveland, runner-up in the American league, has three more games to play they will be unable to catch the Yanks. The Yankees were playing in top form today and won handily 10 to 2 and 10 to 4.

Babe Ruth, ace of the Yankee offensive squad, was instrumental in settling the pennant race today when he hit three home runs in the two games, bringing his season's total to 47.
