Midland to Have Telegraph Office States Mr. Barry

Due to increasingly heavy business out of Midland, the Southern Pacific will establish a telegrapher and probably a station agent at that point within a few days, according to an announcement received here yesterday by S. R. Barry, local freight and passenger agent.

Stock shipments are becoming increasingly heavy, and the development of agriculture with subsequent heavier shipments of farm produce out of that district, together with need for a point for receipt and delivery of train orders, are held accountable for the move.

Midland, one of the outstanding stock loading centers of the entire county, supported a station agent several years ago, but lost this service. Inauguration of through freight service over this line and the increased number of passenger trains impending, also has much to do with the establishment of an agent and telegrapher.

"This will in all probability be year-round service," is Barry's opinion, "and will make Midland an accredited station."

Homedale Tract To Be Improved With New Homes

Another step in the suburban building growth of Klamath Falls was taken yesterday when the Walton, Wright Realty company which last summer opened the Homedale tract, announced that construction will start today on two of six new homes to be erected at an aggregate cost of \$15,000 at Homedale.

George McCullom, local builder, is constructing the homes, most of which will comprise four rooms and bath, with all up-to-date features of modern type houses. McCullom, it was stated, has purchased a number of the Homedale tracts upon which he will build.

One of the two houses upon which construction is to start this week, is planned as a sort of demonstration house for the Walton, Wright firm. This will be rushed to completion and the additional five structures will be completed this fall, it was stated.

There is every evidence that these disappointed out-of-town ticket seekers will come to St. Louis anyway, just to be near to the first world series battle this part of the country has seen in 38 years, and with the wistful hope that by some miracle they will see perhaps one game. Tickets are selling—the few that speculators have managed to get hold of—for from \$50 to \$75 to the series. And there are plenty of takers even at that price.

Only one special train, so far as is known, will bear St. Louis fans to the New York games.
