FINE!

It has been in the air for some days that something important was about to "break," and the news of the Northern lines probably coming is only part of the story. Big men from Portland informed us last week to expect a surprise, and we rather suspected then, and so now, that the Weyerhaeuser's were part of the program.

Which means in substance, more lumber mills, more lumber work, more lumber shipping and more railroads to handle the business already assured. Things appear to be heading very much this way.

VANISHED

Whenever the metropolitan papers run shy on excitement they swing back to the Siskiyou tragedy of three years ago and the D'Autremont boys, long since missing.

A reward of \$14,400 is still on the boards and railway detectives have never stopped tracking and tracing, with all the vigilance of tigers in the jungle. Like the Cyclops disaster on the Atlantic, without a single trace, the mystery of the Siskiyou will continue to puzzle and baffle, although the trail may someday lead to something definite.

The tragedy of it all was probably never anticipated. The punishment is bound to follow to the end of the chapter.

LOOKING AHEAD

A good sized compliment is due the gentlemen who have been promoting the air mail project for Klamath. It is in good hands and has been well-managed. The News has a faculty of looking on occasionally when others are doing good work. This clamoring for recognition and claiming leadership is a bit beyond us. Each in his place and each in his turn means by far the more effective team-work.

This is a good time to get on the band-wagon. The co-operation of the Government with private enterprise is just becoming effective. The development of municipal airports and air mail systems is of tremendous importance here in the West, and will do more than any other agency to put Oregon "on the map." No one is quicker than we to visualize the advantages, and when it comes to generating enthusiasm the News is a pretty good booster.

But taking routes away from other towns and corraling all the benefit to ourselves will not be done in a day. The practical program of the air mail is being figured out by competent experts and will naturally follow the lines of least resistance. According to announced plans the next six

months will see the biggest expansion yet, and we of the Western frontier can afford to be much encouraged. The transporting of passengers will be the logical sequence to all this aviation development, and when that time comes, the panorama of the Klamath country will be the trip de resistance of the entire West coast.

APRON STRINGS

The latest report from the center of Governmental interference is that to-date this country has passed over two million city, state and federal laws, with no less than 100 separate boards and commissions to foster delay and encourage "buck-passing." And since two million are not enough we are to have a federal Sunday-closing law if a certain Wesley Jones of Seattle can have his way. This is the same individual who balladed-up the entire shipping business of America with a fool maritime law that nobody knows to this day what it is all about.

It seems now we are not to be allowed to attend a theatre on Sunday, or go to a ball game, or buy tobacco, or engage in commercialized amusements of any sort, on Sunday. This same Senator Jones wants to tell us all where we hop off and when to jump through, with federal supervision over the morals and conduct of the entire American people. All of which has to be taken into consideration in electing Senators from other States.

If things keep on at this rate we will grow into the biggest bunch of nit-wits the world has yet seen. Talk about other countries going to the bow-wows! Not by a jugful. Almost every other nation has enough gumption on tap to allow for a little personal liberty, and if we are so helpless as not to be allowed any leeway of any sort, we may as well close down now and forget we are alive.

LAKE COUNTY DOING WELL

"Sheep are the salvation of Lake county," declared B. J. Crowley, of Lakeview. "Sheep are the most important asset of the county because of the range, and there are thousands and thousands of the sheep feeding in that section. The sheepmen have always said that a dry year is a disaster, but the past year was very dry and the sheepmen are doing well. In fact, the only trouble has been with a shortage of water in the streams. There is quite a little lumber being manufactured in the county, a number of small mills being in operation. Of course, the people are looking to the time when the narrow-gauge railroad is made a standard gauge. Recently a friend of mine went over the line and says that there are quantities of ties on the right of way and that whenever an old tie is taken out a long one is used to replace it. There have been some changes on the curves and grades and the impression exists that the road will be brought up to standard next year." Speaking of hunting, Mr. Crowley says that this has been a good season, as a game warden informed him that 140 bucks were killed in Lake county on the opening day of the season.

European Powers Form Great Pact Of Iron, Steel

BERLIN, Sept. 30. — (United News)—A European "iron pact," which experts believe will develop into an all European iron and steel trust, has been signed by the iron magnates of Germany, France, Belgium and Luxembourg.

Negotiations for formation of this international group of iron industrialists have been conducted at various times for the last two and a half years, frequently it seemed that an agreement was near. Industrialists claim that the control intended by the iron pact will not exclude free competition. It will, they point out, eliminate the danger of over production and the consequent danger of campaigns of under selling.

The plan of cooperation as finally accepted was finally drafted by Dr. Fritz Thyssen, owner of large steel mills in the Ruhr. The quota of production as specified by Thyssen is as follows:

Germany 43.18 per cent; France 31.19 per cent; Belgium 11.63 per cent; Luxembourg 3.22 per cent. The remainder will be allotted to the iron industry of the Saar district and will amount to 5.77 per cent.
