

## Peaches Browning May Have Deserted Elderly Husband

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—(United News)—The question of what caused twelve reverberating notes to toll from the clock of Cinderella "Peaches" Browning has agitated the subway and dumb waiter literati of this town to a greater degree than any epochal event since an Indian guide was said to have turned his hand to writing love letters from postcards.

So far there is no answer from the 16-year-old Cinderella, nor from Edward Browning, her gray-haired husband, and erstwhile lavish Prince Charming, who during business hours is a real estate man.

Browning merely issues statements that he still loves the blonde youngster. Peaches has vanished into the fastnesses of New Jersey, accompanied, according to several statements, by her mother and a goodly part of the array of clothing and knick-knacks upon which Browning is said to have invested approximately \$30,000 since they were married last April 10.

At any rate when the Cinderella girl and her mother parked up at the famous love nest in Kew Gardens Inn last Saturday they didn't leave any glass slippers.

One person who might know says they "took everything but the varnish."

Browning, who admits 51 years, was obviously sincerely worried over the situation Tuesday. He sat in his office and issued a statement to newspaper men in which he avoided using the word "separation." He kept a clock busy during a large part of the day clipping newspaper reports of Peaches' desire for a separation.

Meanwhile he wrote out in pencil for reporters: "I love my wife from the bottom of my heart. More than anything in this whole world, and there has never been a minute since the day we were married that I would not have given my life for her."

Although Browning could not bring himself to confirm a separation Johann, the old family retainer who pilots the old family baby blue Rolls Royce, proved less reticent. Johann has hitherto been considered a very reliable second spokesman.

"He bought her mother \$6000 worth of clothes," said Johann, not without emotion, "and last Friday she packs up \$15,000 of her own clothes and makes me drive with them to her mother's flat, and the next day she goes out and buys \$6000 more worth of clothes. And on Saturday Mr. Browning gets

## Klamath Booth at State Fair Given Highest Honors
