

CARDS HAMMER YANK PITCHERS

World's Series Forced Into Seventh Game by Western Aggregation Headed By Rogers Hornsby, Leader of First Team West of the City of Chicago

NEW YORK, Oct. 9. (United Press)—Coming back to the form they lost at home with a burst of furious and vicious hitting the St. Louis Cards drew up even again with the New York Yanks and forced the world series into a seventh game, when they smothered the American league champions in the sixth game by a score of 10 to 2.

It was a surprising game in several respects. The Yankees suffered an almost complete reversal of form and the pitching was spotty; their defense was lazy and just as spotty.

The attendance also was a distinct disappointment to the club owners. After the reception that New York woke up to give the Yanks on their return from St. Louis last night and with three-fourths of the city's population in possession of a Saturday half holiday, it was expected that a new record of 65,000 spectators would be established.

But there were only 48,615 paid admissions, and holes yawned with empty seats in the bleachers and in the unreserved sections of the grandstand.

Rather casual interest was shown in the final game tomorrow. Tickets were placed on sale immediately after the game, but there was nothing of the rush expected for the seats.

The Yankees blew the one-game lead with which they returned from St. Louis principally because Miller Huggins gambled with a pitcher, and Rogers Hornsby couldn't afford to take a chance with a St. Louis pitcher.

The Yanks placed their stake on Bob Shawkey, the oldest and most experienced world's series pitcher on the staff, and after a hectic experience he was knocked out of the box in the seventh. Urban Shocker did little better, when he relieved Shawkey, and he was relieved for a pinch hitter, Huggins had no one left but young Myles Thomas.

The Cardinals, on the other hand, called upon Grover Cleveland Alexander in their desperation, and old Alex delivered one of his masterful games. The Yanks got to him for only two runs, but the veteran might have had a shut-out, but he was satisfied with a lead and didn't work any harder than he was forced to.

The Cardinals bunched their hits when hits were needed and pushed over three encouraging runs in the first inning.

Another satisfying run in the fifth and five clinching runs in the seventh.

The Yanks couldn't hit when hits meant runs, because Alexander wouldn't let them hit. He pitched to Babe Ruth and all the Yankee sluggers and made them look weak with curve balls that he kept close to their shirt fronts during the entire game.

With the series squared at three-all and the rich prize depending upon tomorrow's game, the Cards became a five-to-three favorite in the betting to win the series.

The Cardinals, with Jess Haines ready to work, have a decided pitching advantage as the Yanks will have to gamble either on Herb Pennock or Dutch Reuther.

The Cards jumped right out in the lead in the first inning. Holm singled and was forced at second by Southworth. Shawkey wobbled and passed Hornsby. Bottomley doubled, scoring Southworth, and then Lester Bell singled and drove Hornsby and Bottomley for the three runs that eventually proved enough to win the ball game.

Shawkey worked better in the second, third and fourth innings, retiring the Cards in order with the help of some smart Yank fielding.

The Cards pushed over another run in the fifth on a single by Thevenow, a sacrifice by Alexander and a single by Holm.

The Cards clinched the game in the seventh when they scored five runs on five hits and an error, knocked Shawkey out of the box. Lester Bell's homer was the feature of an inning in which Thevenow and Hornsby got singles and Hafey and Southworth scored by triple by Southworth and an infield out of Hornsby.

The Yanks were baffled by the smart pitching of Alexander in the first three innings, but they pushed over a run in the fourth inning by

a triple by Meusel and a single by Dugan.

Alexander retired the side in order in the fifth inning, but himself into a hole by passing Ruth, the first batter in the sixth inning. Holm made two fine running catches for outs and Alexander fanned Gehrig to retire the side.

The Yanks scored their second run in the seventh inning on a single by Dugan, a wild throw to first by Bell and a single by Combs.

With a commanding lead Alexander eased up and had a narrow escape in the eighth inning. He walked Meusel, the first batter up, and Gehrig singled. Hafey then made a nice catch on Lazzeri and Southworth pulled him out of the hole by making a sensational shoe-string catch in right field and throwing to second base for a double play on Meusel, who had almost touched third, thinking that it was a sure two-base hit.

Alexander breezed through the ninth, having such a lead that he had no fear of losing the game.

The game was marked by brilliant fielding, and also by loose fielding in the pinches as the two clubs clearly showed the strain under which they were laboring.

STANFORD DEFEAT OLYMPICS 7 TO 3

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 9. (United Press)—Stanford, after trailing behind a 3 to 0 score for three periods, made a desperate rally in the last minutes of play to score a touchdown and defeat the Olympic club of San Francisco 7 to 3, this afternoon at Stanford stadium.

Stanford's touchdown came after a scare had been thrown into the stands occupied by thousands of Cardinal enthusiasts. The Cardinal march for the winning points started on its own 40-yard line. An Olympic penalty gave the conference team 15 yards. Hoffman threw a perfect pass to Murphy, who caught it behind the line of scrimmage and dashed 24 yards before being down on Olympic's 20 yard where Sims went through left tackle for a touchdown, Murphy converting.

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U. of O. Defeated By Washington by Score of 23 to 9

PORTLAND, Oct. 9. (United Press)—The University of Oregon football team was outplayed and outgeneraled by the University of Washington gridiron squad here this afternoon, the Huskies, coast champions last year, winning by a score of 23 to 9.

During the first half it looked as though Oregon had a chance to win, the score being Oregon 9 and Washington 7 at half time. In the third period, however, the Huskies had the ball most of the time, running their score up to 16. Washington annexed seven more points in the final quarter.

Patton, Husky half back, made a 37-yard run early in the first quarter, carrying the ball over the line for a touchdown. He made another touchdown in the fourth quarter, backing it over from the three-yard line.

Oregon started out with a rush, when they stopped Tesreau behind his own goal line, when he attempted to punt, scoring a safety. After the ball had been brought out to the 20-yard line, Oregon blocked and recovered a punt by Tesreau and Wetzel scored on a pass from Woodie immediately after.

The second half was slow, considerable time being lost through many penalties. The only spectacular feat was during the third quarter when Woodie dropped a punt and Cutting, Washington end, scooped it up and ran 19 yards for a touchdown.

Shortly after the third period opened Washington went from mid-field to Oregon's three-yard line, but were unable to buck it over in three downs. Tesreau then dropped back and kicked a field goal from the 15-yard line.
