

Expansion Week Is Approved by Fathers of City

In recognition of the important role which the local chamber of commerce has played in the development of Klamath county and to place the official stamp of approval on the extensive program outlined for the fall membership campaign, the council of this city has voted a proclamation for "Civic Expansion Week."

Sponsored by the chamber of commerce and slated for an intensive campaign that will outdo similar ones of previous years, "Civic Expansion Week" will extend from October 14 to 21, inclusive. The already rapid growth of the organization's membership is expected to be eclipsed by the results during "Civic Expansion Week."

The aim of this active civic group is for unceasing development and betterment of the community, and the hearty approval of the city officials over past successes of the body, as well as hope for future strength, is expressed in the following proclamation, issued by the council:

PROCLAMATION
Due to the greatly increased program of work which has been adopted by the Chamber of Commerce, it has been deemed proper to set aside one week in this month to be known as "Civic Expansion Week," at which time the people of this city will be asked to lend their assistance to the work of our community organization.

Every citizen of Klamath Falls and Klamath County is receiving benefit from the work of the Chamber of Commerce. The activities of this civic body are bringing results of everlasting benefit to this our city and county.

Therefore we, Mayor of Klamath Falls and Members of the Common Council, in regular meeting Monday, October 11, 1926, have decreed that October 14 to 21 shall be set aside to be known as "Civic Expansion Week" in Klamath Falls, Klamath county, Oregon.

M., for the making of the proposed improvement of Pine Street from the easterly line of Eleventh Street to the westerly line of Eleventh Street and known as the 59th Improvement Unit.

Said proposed improvement to be made includes grading the streets full width, constructing combination curbs and gutters, building cement sidewalks, paving the roadway, and providing drainage facilities for the disposal of the storm sewers, the same to be in all respects according to the plans of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge.

Said proposed improvement to be made in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, reference to which is hereby made regarding further detail for plans, construction, materials, quantities and the like.

Said proposed improvement will be made in one contract and bids will be received for each kind of pavement specified above and will be open for consideration by the Common Council on the 18th day of October, 1926, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M. Bidders will be required to submit bids on blanks prepared by the City Engineer, and bids will not be considered unless so submitted. Bids for bids may be obtained in the office of the City Engineer or Police Judge.

The successful bidder will be required to give bond in a sum to be fixed by the Common Council for the faithful performance of the contract to be entered into for making said improvement.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on some responsible bank for 5% of the amount bid, as guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the city for the making of such improvement within ten days from the date of making such award.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, and to make such improvement on behalf of the city.

Search, Seizure Law Is Declared Constitutional

SALEM, Oct. 12.—(United News)—The constitutionality of the Oregon law on search and seizure was upheld by the supreme court in an opinion written and handed down by Justice Coshaw Tuesday.

The opinion sustains the appeal taken by the state from the decree of Circuit Judge Bagley of Tillamook county in the case against C. F. Deford. Inasmuch as Deford was acquitted in the lower court on a charge of possession and transportation of liquor the opinion of the supreme court does not affect his status, but only goes to show the constitutionality of the law, which was held void by Judge Bagley.

American Legion Parade Greatest History of Order

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—(United News)—The big parade of the American legionnaires passed before Philadelphians, after the eighth convention had heard Vice President Dawes denounce the direct primary in national political affairs.

Friendly invitations from the French government to bring the next convention to Paris also fell upon the ears of the veterans.

At the stadium of the Sesqui-centennial, the destination of the colorful array, Pershing and Dawes sat in the reviewing stand with army and navy officials to watch the spectacle.

In a vigorous speech Dawes denounced the primary system of electing public officials. He urged legionnaires to get out the vote and said:

"Personally I believe the primary should be largely abolished and that if we follow the ordinary plan of representative government laid down in our constitution by providing for nominations by conventions a better and more impartial class of candidates will result."

Pershing's address stopped the convention for ten minutes. He has been boomed for the national commandery by legion members, who said his name would soothe any difficulties arising out of transporting the legion to France.

He spoke to the convention as a "fellow doughboy," and his only "orders" were that all who could shave should have a clean face for the parade in the afternoon.

Official business was discarded during the second day session. The time and place committee was ready to recommend that the convention go to Paris next October, but action upon it was delayed because the parade necessitated early adjournment. The report will be taken up Wednesday.

The parade was led by Dawes, Pershing, National Commander John R. McQuinn and past National Commander James A. Drane. Up in front was the Miami, Fla., band, led by Ruth Payne, an orange garbed Joan of Arc on a horse.

Sergeant Alvin York, who Pershing said was the outstanding hero of the war, tramped at the head of the Tennessee delegation.

Today's outbreak and head waging is a result of the machine gun murders of Earl "Hymie" Weiss, king of the bootleggers, and his aide, Patrick Murray, and the wounding of W. W. Of course all of the dead and injured were prominent in one way or another and the fact that the shooting took place in front of Holy Name cathedral in broad daylight added to its glamor.

So the whole town is going through the old familiar motions again and there are persistent rumors of reprisals, as the violence is believed to be but another chapter in the long war between west side, or Cicero gangs, and the gangs of the north side, formerly headed by Dion O'Banion.

Both factions have found the alcohol and beer running business so profitable that neither hesitates to commit murder as a routine part of its enterprise.

Needless to say many of the lives sacrificed this way, except when such men as Assistant State's Attorney McSwiggan are unfortunate enough to be in the line of fire, are no great loss to the community. Eventuality gangland's birth rate may fall below its homicide rate, so that the gangsters will completely exterminate each other. But it is characteristic of gang lords that they rear large families.

For this reason Chief Collins admits that gang wars are likely to continue indefinitely, and that he can do no more than go through the motions of stopping them. In the present case Collins' men were looking for "Scarface" at Caponi and Johnny Torrio, the millionaire gamblers who were suspected in the machine gunning of McSwiggan. But as usual Caponi and Torrio dropped out of sight, as did the more prominent of their henchmen. In a few days they will come back, the police will be unable to prove anything on them and they will return to their old haunts to resume hostilities.

Raising Turkeys On Broad Scale Is Aim of Setak

Dan Liskey and his brother, Dave Liskey, Malin, who own 1600 acres of splendid farm land in the Swan Lake country, and who are now farming leased land in the Tule Lake bed, six miles south of Malin, have leased the Swan Lake land to William Setak for a five-year period it was learned yesterday.

Mr. and Mrs. Setak and child will move to Swan Lake within the near future and operate the farm there.

Setak, who owns a large alfalfa and grain ranch in the Spring Lake district and who served as superintendent of the state penitentiary farm at Salem, is going into the raising of turkeys and enters into it with wide experience.

Only pure bred turkeys will be raised by Setak. It was learned last night, and from 300 turkey hens, he expects to raise 6,000 fine birds by next year. That the idea is not futile was proved recently by Setak who obtained 100 turkeys from three hens. The turkeys will be raised until time to take them into the Tule Lake country where they will be kept for the summer months until holiday season.

The Liskey boys, who have leased the land to Setak, are owners of the finest hogs found in southern Oregon, and at the present time have 1,700 head of the porkers, all of which they find a local market awaiting.
