

Bishop Remington Will Preside at Minister Meeting

In preparation for the first preaching mission in Klamath Falls by St. Paul's Episcopal church, announcement was made last night by Rev. J. Henry Thomas, rector of St. Paul's concerning the program of work which Bishop William P. Remington of the diocese of Eastern Oregon, assisted by Rev. William Bradner of Cove, Oregon, will enter into upon their arrival here.

The mission will open tomorrow morning at 8:30 o'clock with holy communion. Church school under the leadership of the new superintendent and his assistants, will start at 10 o'clock and the preaching services will be held at 11 o'clock and again at 7:30 o'clock. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the bishop and his assistants will hold services in Chilquien.

According to Rev. Thomas' announcement there will be classes in personal religion conducted every afternoon, with the exception of Saturday at 3 o'clock, by Bishop Remington. Preaching services will be conducted at 8 o'clock.

On Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 4:15 o'clock, there will be special service for the children and adults, and their parents are requested to attend.

Rev. William Bradner will conduct the children's classes. Rev. Bradner is a graduate of Yale and Harvard, and the son of Rev. Dr. Bradner, the eminent eastern educator, now of Rhode Island. The children are urged to attend directly after school and they will be dismissed at 5 o'clock. Rev. Thomas stated.

Members of the church are awaiting the arrival today of Bishop Remington from Pendleton, and Rev. Bradner of Cove, who will be welcomed by Rev. Thomas.

Water Users to Voice Grievance With Board Today

Water users in the Klamath Irrigation district will be given an opportunity to voice their grievance before a board of equalization at the county court house today, according to E. V. Hillius, secretary for the district, who stated that only one complaint had been filed in his office.

The law requires that the complaints and applications for readjustments be filed 15 days before the board holds session, but technically all grievances will be heard today whether previously filed or not. The board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district will act as the equalization board and will hold their first session this morning, extending through the day if need be.

This board of equalization will be for the Klamath district only, and does not include complaints from other smaller districts under the project. In addition to hearing grievances, the board will listen to applications for reductions in area, and suspensions from payment of O. & M. construction charges. All grievances heard today will be adjusted at this sitting, it was stated.

TROPICAL STORM HEADING TOWARDS SANTA DOMINGO

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—(United News)—Evidence of a tropical disturbance of slight intensity about 50 miles north of Santo Domingo, was reported by the weather bureau here tonight. A message received at 10 p. m. stated that pressure is below normal and falling slowly toward the Bahamas and Bermuda.

Klamath Youths Reach Portland To Stand Trial

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—(United News)—Alleged to have looted five homes in the vicinity of Klamath Falls on October 2, Elday Cross, 15, Frank Marbeck, 19, and Felix Jackson, all of that city, were brought to Portland Friday by Deputy U. S. Marshal Wells. They were bound over to the grand jury by J. C. Thomas, United States Commissioner, in default of \$1,000 bonds.

Murdoch and Jackson are Indians while Cross is white.

Another prisoner brought by Wells was Madge Cram, who is being held under bail of \$500 as a material witness in the white slave case against James Nolan, 55, who is alleged to have transported Mrs. Cram from Talent, Ore., to Wattsburg, Wash., back to Bend and then to Klamath Falls. Nolan's bail was fixed at \$2,500, and he was placed in the county jail, while Mrs. Cram and her two children are being kept at the home of the Volunteers of America here.
