

Fight Card of Tuesday Night Is Humdinger

The big ring in Scandia hall will be up in shape for tonight's work-outs. It was announced last night, when all participants in the October 19 fight festivities will take their final practice turns in preparation for one of the fastest boxing cards of the fall season.

Tickets now on sale at the Rex, Waldorf and Mecca poolrooms, are going like wildfire, and by Tuesday afternoon should give a proper gauge of the crowd which will witness the fistie frolic that evening.

"Tiny" Herman, here Friday from Portland for a week's deer hunting, will step into the ring for a few seconds Tuesday evening, to be introduced to local fans.

Herman will probably appear here in a few weeks, according to the local matchmaker, who is a friend of long standing with the big Portland heavyweight, "Tiny." If he comes here to fight, will probably meet the victor in the Ritchie-Serrati bout slated for November 2. And there, to quote the majority, will be a battle of renown. This lad Tiny is a moose for size, speedy as a galleon, and with the punch of a pile driver. He is counted among the leading heavies in the country.

Both Callahan and Sharkey, principals on the October card, are up in shape and raring to go. Much curiosity as to how the popular Sharkey will fare against the battling Irishman, is being voiced by Klamath fans. The kid has the reputation of being a surprise fighter. He can be licked in three corners and the center of the ring and in the last round win the fight in the fourth corner. Consequently most anything is likely to come out of the battle with the rose city leather pusher.

Callahan is one of the fastest boys to ever step off in Klamath Falls, the well known Benny Dodson not excluded. Not only is Tim a speed demon, but he likes to mix it, and will stand up to stern punches with the best of them. Hence the indications for a real rain event Tuesday evening.

Joe Coffman and Bobby White are staging the semi-wind-up, which means another real battle on the card. Evenly matched, in virtually every respect, these two boys are slated to put up a thrilling scrap. Both are known here and White, having fought several times locally, probably has the edge for popularity. But a fight crowd is fickle, and if Joe does the proper stuff, fandom may attach the thinking spurs of favoritism to his shifty heels.

In the four-round special, with which Pat McFadden and Mike Daly will entertain the fans, will be seen another regular he-man scrap. These boys fought a draw on the Labor day card and won laurels for themselves, over the main eventers that day.

Kid Ryder and Bill Bailey will do the rough and tumble preliminary in true barnstorming style, adding a few extra features of their own concoction.

MARY SPEDIS IS DEAD
THE DALLES, Ore., Oct. 16.—(United Press)—Mary Spedis, reputed to have been 135 years of age, was at rest today with her ancestors in the tribal cemetery at the village of Wishram, four miles east of The Dalles, across the Columbia river, in Washington.

The aged woman, who witnessed the historic trip of Lewis and Clark down the Columbia, died Thursday and was buried yesterday.

News of her death was brought here today by Martin Spedis, 55, her grandson.

Klamath Loses to Medford in Fast Football Contest

Klamath Falls, fighting against heavy odds, lost a game fight to Medford when the Rogue River Valley warriors stepped off home to the tune of 34 to 0. The Pelican Hotel fire took away a big share of the crowd but there was plenty of support for French's men, who failed to cross Medford's goal, although they threatened it repeatedly.

There were no excuses to offer; the Klamath boys, comparatively young at the game of football in comparison with the visitors, went up against a veteran team of three and four-year lettermen.

It looked like an even break at the start of the game and with the first whistle, Medford kicked and Hall received. Klamath lost the ball and Medford started a steady march down the field and threatened Klamath's goal. Medford lost on downs.

Klamath Starts Driskily.
Klamath's ball, and Hopkins, 135-pound half, started in a series of brilliant plays. Klamath walked down to the 20-yard line and punted away to Medford, who started a series of fake plays and plunges. They were forced to punt finally and Pruitt received the ball. Klamath's other half showed up with good team work and the ball was put through a series of end runs and line plunges that netted nothing.

Klamath lost the ball on downs, and shortly after one of the most spectacular plays of the game was enacted when Pruitt snagged a Medford man after a 40-yard run toward the goal.

Zed Barnes was able to enter the game in the second quarter and while racing for a goal, Medford brought him down, suffering a penalty of 15 yards for dirty playing.

Touchdown By Medford
Medford's first touchdown came near the end of the second quarter and was earned after hard play. Medford gained the ball from Klamath by blocking a punt. Sinn, Medford fullback, who has grown up with the team, carried the ball for three downs, and on first and goal, with but six yards to go, Medford went over in a line plunge. They converted, 7-0.

Klamath kicked the ball into territory and Medford snagged it from the air. Waldeen Upp, end, pulled the Medford man where he caught the ball and the fight started again. Barnes and Hall worked a pretty combination and both had good interference when they carried the ball. They did not have, however, the protection that Medford carried.

At the end of the half, the score stood 7-0, with a heavy rain storm coming over the Klamath hills.

Second Half Opens
Pat Lucas, husky Klamath tackle, kicked the ball for the opening of the second half. It was here that Klamath lost all footing and Medford started out for a series of walk-aways that may prove death to Klamath's hopes for the southern Oregon conference championship unless Ashland upsets the dope altogether.

Lucas kicked off, out of bounds. Sent the ball out again and Medford returned to her 30-yard line. An end run, incompleting pass, off-tackle plays, and Medford got down and started again, first and ten. An end run that looked like another point for Medford was ruined by Zed Barnes who snagged the man to the ground, now a light mud-coated field. The rain began to fall shortly after Referee Weber whistled for the second half.

CRISS-CROSS PLAYS
Criss-cross plays were used by Medford in a hope they would prove effective for the lighter men. They did not. Klamath was light, but wary and on the five-yard line, held the visitors until the fourth down when Sinn went over in an end run. Sinn converted and the score stood 14-0.

Thirsty Americans Have Playground Close to Florida

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(United Press)—A new playground, Mecca for thirsty Americans, and for the tired business man is to be established on the Grand Bahamas, sixty miles off Florida.

The British crown has granted the right of the possession to a group of American and British business men, headed by William Fox, movie magnate, and the island is to be turned into a resort.

The grant is for 150 years. Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews, it was learned tonight, has been approached by Colonel W. P. Brinkman, St. Louis, an officer of the new venture, and asked if establishing a "playground in the Bahamas" would conflict with his prohibition enforcement program.

Andrews favors the idea. He believes that with such a resort so close to the United States many thirsty Americans would go to the island instead of depending on bootleggers to furnish their liquor.

Mrs. McPherson Defense Is Now Being Introduced

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 16.—(United News)—Followers of Amice Scumple McPherson are counting upon their religious leader's personal appearance on the witness stand as the strongest means of clearing herself of charges of perjury and the conspiracy to obstruct justice.

With the state's case rested, presentation of defense testimony was started today. It was announced that the titian-haired evangelist will represent herself as a witness in her own defense. Her followers feel that her very presence on the stand will do much to establish her innocence.

Start of the defense testimony was delayed today by a legal controversy over the right of Mrs. Gail N. Koontz to testify. The defense offered Mrs. Koontz as its first witness, in order to show that she, and not the evangelist, sent a telegram from Gila Bend to Tucson, Ariz., on June 14, shortly before Mrs. McPherson made her dramatic re-appearance at Agua Prieta.

The state argued that only state's evidence can be presented at the preliminary hearing, but Judge Blake ruled that he would allow Mrs. Koontz and other defense witnesses to testify.

W. I. Gilbert, counsel for the defense, has ready a long list of witnesses, by whom he expects to show that Mrs. McPherson was not the companion of Kenneth G. Ormiston, missing radio operator at Carmel by the sea, during her prolonged disappearance.

Meanwhile a new difficulty appeared in prospect for the feminine evangelist in the form of a possible federal investigation of certain letters sent through the mails.

U. S. Attorney Channesian said postal inspectors will be assigned to trace the "avenger" letters received by Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of the evangelist, which purported to come from Mrs. McPherson's "kidnappers."
