

FIGHTERS READY FOR CONTEST

Welterweights in Pink of Condition For Bout Tonight

Starkey and Callahan Eager to Exchange Blows at Scandia Hall; Three Other Interesting Bouts on Card.

Fight fans are confident that the card in Scandia hall tonight will be equally as sensational and even more interesting than the Labor Day battles, judging from the rate at which tickets are being sold. Indications yesterday were for a capacity house and a crowd somewhat in excess of that of September 6.

The eight glove gladiators whose blood will add the final color to the fistful festival are all in prime condition after a series of grueling workouts, and last night went through a light exercise in the arena at Scandia to get the feel of the boards.

Kid Starkey and Tim Callahan are the drawing cards for the big fight event tonight and it is largely to the prowess of these two pugilists and the questionable outcome of the match, that the wide interest in the card is attributed. The fighting workmen are in to offer fans a really bigtime scrap; Starkey to defend his wide popularity in Klamath Falls, and Callahan to further establish himself with local fans.

"Tiny" Herman, well known Portland heavyweight who is to be introduced in the ring tonight, says Callahan is a popular boy around Portland squared circles and anticipates that the speedy Irishman will surprise Klamath ring devotees with the stuff he'll undoubtedly let loose for Starkey's benefit. Those who are familiar with Starkey, know that he will do just a little more than his share toward making the boxing match a thrilling fight, as he has always done so in the past. Tim on the other hand, will take everything that comes his way as long as he is on his feet, and judging from a recent performance here against Fugate, the Irisher will keep his feet for a majority of rounds, at least.

Herman's advent into the Klamath territory is regarded as significant by fight enthusiasts here. Tiny is a tough customer with whom to do business and efforts in the past to get him to fight here have been in vain. But now with another heavyweight tilt coming up between Hithie and Saretti, and the local matchmaker desirous of matching the winner with the Portland bruiser, it is believed that an opportunity to see the big man maul in action will soon be forthcoming.

The semi-windup is worthy of a top-notch place on a fight card here, as Bobby White and Joe Coffman who are to stage the semi, are fighters with class. No love-tap rounds in this event. Rather will it be a flashy affair replete with smacks and socks of an yell-provoking variety. White is a real comer and ever since his first fight here has been advancing steadily up the ladder of fan favoritism. Coffman on the other glove, scored an instant hit here when he knocked out Jack O'Brien in the first round of a special event. Here's more power to both battlers; may each place a blow with every breath and the breathing be heavy.

A four-round special between Mike Dal, Pelican City pug, and Pat McFadden, skookum battler from the southland, will be an outstanding treat tonight, slated to steady measures of glory from both the main and semi-windup events. Both these boys are real fighters whose countenances seem to indicate an inherent love for the sport. The harder they're hit the wider these two glove slammers grin, and a knockout means a hearty laugh from the lad who meets the canvas—maybe.

At any rate this event will be a good one. Their Labor Day appearance guarantees this, and unless the dope bucket springs an awful leak before 8:30 this evening, fans will be sorry to see this little ring tussle draw to a close, whether it be by K. O. or the bell.

Johnny Bates, the boy who measures six ax handles and a plug of star between the shoulders, and Kid Ryder, the original knockout youth, are doing the curtain-raiser and a lot of laughs is promised in the event. Be on hand when the card commences at 8:30 promptly, and get all the kick, is the advice of the promoter. The doors open at 7:30 sharp for the benefit of those desiring general admission tickets.

PROMINENT EDUCATOR IS DECLARED GUILTY

Paroled Convict Violates Codes To Visit Friend

SANQUENTIN, Oct. 18.—(United News)—The desire to see a comrade with whom he had served 22 years behind the walls of San Quentin penitentiary has cost Ray Briggs his liberty for the next three years.

Briggs entered the prison in September, 1902, to serve two terms, one for grand larceny and the other for assault with intent to kill. In September, 1925, with about three years yet to serve, he was paroled because of good conduct.

After his release Briggs worked steadily for a year. Then he thought of a San Quentin friend, whom he decided to visit.

Appearing at the prison with the request that he be allowed to see this former companion, Briggs was recognized as an ex-convict. To make matters worse Briggs denied the charge. Fingerprints and a photograph were taken and his identity was proved.

In California's penal law is a statute making Briggs' action a misdemeanor. He therefore had violated terms of his parole.

Briggs is now in the gloomy San Quentin dungeon. Prison officials said that he would be transferred to Folsom prison to work out the three remaining years of his term on the rockpile of that institution.

Jim Bagwell Was Leading Batter In Coast League

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—(United News)—Jim Bagwell, big Portland outfielder, was the leading batter of the 1926 Pacific Coast league season, and Earl Hamilton, veteran Los Angeles southpaw, was the circuit's outstanding pitcher.

Bagwell, playing in 155 games, ran up a batting average of .391. Marty Krug of the Angels, playing in 52 games, had an average of .389. Buzz Arlett, Oakland outfielder, had a mark of .384, while Mike Boone, Mission outfielder, batted .350 in 173 games.

Hamilton had a record of 24 wins and eight defeats for an average of .750. Two other Los Angeles pitchers, "Doc" Wright and "Doc" Crandall, followed him in the averages.

Wright won 19 and lost 7 for a mark of .731, while Crandall turned in 20 victories and nine defeats for .731.

Elmer Smith of Portland smacked out 46 home runs; Swanson, Mission outfielder, led in stolen bases with 43. Swanson also scored the most runs, 157.

Reed Continues Political Inquiry In Middle West

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Senator James A. Reed, chairman of the senate committee investigating funds, sparred two rounds with the Anti-Saloon league today before several dozen camp followers who had packed themselves into the little grand jury room in the federal building.

Altogether it was a good exhibition. The atmosphere was jovial and the caustic Missourian found several occasions to draw parallels between his own political tactics and those of the dregs.

There was the matter of education, for example. P. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league of America, told the committee chairman that his organization's work was one of education.

"When I make speeches they are to educate the people in regard to prohibition," McBride said.

"Exactly," Reed replied. "You and I are alike in that respect. Every political speech I make is intended as an education for my audience."

Reed did his best to keep the inquiry in a dignified vein, but things kept bubbling up which appeared to him to be funny and he could not help making the most of them.

The principal witnesses of the day were McBride and George Safford, state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league. Although their testimony was halting and came out only after considerable parrying, it revealed the inside story of the political changes that have taken place in Illinois since Reed adjourned his inquiry here last August.

Grand Jury Has Missing Papers To Investigate

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 18.—(United News)—The "missing papers," believed hidden by former Klan dragon D. C. Stephenson before going to prison, and which promised to reveal the full story of Klan power in Indiana, were in the hands of the grand jury as it swung into the second week of its inquiry into political corruption.

Miss Mildred Mead, Stephenson's stenographer, who appeared dramatically after a week's absence, led Prosecutor W. H. Remy to the documents in the safe deposit box.

Before revealing the hiding place of the documents Miss Meade was questioned for more than two hours by the jurors.

Other witnesses questioned Monday were Maxine Elliot, former secretary to Stephenson, and Carl Lowey, a close personal friend of the ex-dragon.

While the grand jury was in session nine members of the republican editorial association met here and denounced Thomas Adams' part in the inquiry as unauthorized. Adams headed a special committee of the association which started the politico-klan probe.

The editors, however, approved the grand jury probe, and asked that it be made a "thorough airing."

SOCIALIST DISLIKES WAR QUEEN MARIE TWISTED

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(United News)—The socialist candidate for governor of New York, Judge Jacob Panken, thinks the officials of the city and state of New York and of the nation are carrying their welcome to Queen Marie of Rumania altogether too far.

He termed the behavior of these American officials, from President Coolidge on down as "maudlin genuflections," and "groveling before the queen of the most corruptly governed country in Europe."
