

Tim Callahan Awarded Decision Over Kid Starkey

Amid a raucous medley of cheers and jeers, Tim Callahan, formerly of Portland, won a ten-round decision over Kid Starkey, local fighter, in the main event of a thrilling fight card staged in Scandia hall last night.

Quick to realize the advantage of his characteristic in-fighting against the taller Callahan, Starkey played close to the Irishman throughout the ten rounds and put in his share of the ground work. Raucous and constructed along stream lines, Callahan's long arms swung effectively on the get-aways, but the entire scrap was a series of short jabs in the clinches.

A year went up when Bobby Ross, veteran referee, lifted Callahan's arm in the move which acclaimed the Irishman, victor in the tough ten-round scrap. But in the verbal battles which followed the final fight, Tim's supporters held up their hands.

From the ring, Starkey declared he would meet the Irishman again any time, any place and under any conditions. Callahan, accepted the challenge, so it is likely that before many moons local fans will have an opportunity to see another go between the two.

Joe Coffman and Bobby White fought a sensational battle listed as the semi-windup, which was a hard scrap from the opening gong. Coffman won the decision after six rounds of the snappiest fighting on the card, a tilt which came mightily close to being a draw. White was in his usual form and perhaps in better condition than Joe but the latter took Bobby's sledgehammer blows like a veteran, and returned his share of the telltale stuff. Coffman shows a wider ring experience than the local boy, but lacks White's sensational flourishes.

The draw announced for the four-round special between Mike Daly and Pat McFadden, was the most popular decision of the evening and came at the end of a fight which kept the fans in an uproar of cheering. That the event was worthy the name headliner, could be seen from the enthusiasm of the onlookers.

Evenly matched and willing to scrap, these two boys form a combination which is an asset to any card. No stalling in this fight, and clinches were reduced to a minimum. Fast fighting and plenty of it in every round.

Kid Ryder won the decision over Johnny Bates in the preliminary. Bates got in a lot of dirty work on rebounds from the ropes and it looked for a time like he'd connect with Ryder for a finish, but the latter got next to side-stepping the little boy's rope rushes and won the tilt.

Tod Morgan Wins Cool Fight Over Johnny Dundee

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19.—(United News)—Tod Morgan, boxing coolly and with more skill than he has shown in previous Pacific coast engagements, retained his junior lightweight championship by winning a referee's decision over Johnny Dundee, veteran of 17 years in the ring, at Recreation park here tonight.

Morgan won six of the ten rounds and none of the 14,000 spectators questioned the decision.

The champion weighed 128½ pounds and Dundee 126½.

Dundee turned in a colorful performance, but was not quite good enough to win back the title he lost to Kid Sullivan in 1925.

The Italian challenger injured his right hand in the third round and was using his left only in the later rounds. It was a slow fight until the eighth round, with Morgan fighting deliberately and skillfully. Ringsiders gave Morgan six rounds and the other four were even.

Harry Ertle of New Jersey was the referee.

Fighter Wills Is Suspended by N. Y. Commission

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—(United News)—Harry Wills, who fouled so persistently in his recent match with Jack Sharkey that Referee Patsy Haley threw him out of the ring, has been suspended for 30 days by the New York State Athletic commission.

The suspension is automatic in compliance with a new ruling by the boxing board. Wills had no intention of fighting within 30 days anyhow, and was paid his money for the Sharkey bout.

AMERICAN OLYMPIC MEETING ON NOVEMBER 17-18

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—(United News)—A call has gone out for the quadrennial meeting of the American Olympic association, which will be held at the national chamber of commerce building in Washington on November 17-18.

A national Olympic committee, which will work out plans for participation of the United States in the 1928 games at Amsterdam, will be elected.

January 1 to 2, Long Beach, \$2,500.

January 5 to 9, Los Angeles, \$10,000.

Second southern California tourney date \$5,000.

Golfers who are planning the trek westward to collect this prize money, include George Duncan, British star; Macdonald Smith, metropolitan champion; Bill Melhorn, Texas; Bobby Cruickshank and Harry Cooper, winner of the Los Angeles, \$10,000 open last year.

NORWEGIAN DRYS BADLY DEFEATED

OSLO, Norway, Oct. 19.—(United News)—Norwegian prohibitionists have been crushed in overwhelming defeat and the last venture of Norway's dry law, a ban against spirituous liquors, has been rejected in a nation-wide plebiscite, and is doomed to the discard.

By a vote of 591,581 against the law to 295,100 in favor, the people registered their disapproval of the ban which has remained as the only part of a more comprehensive dry law passed at the beginning of the world war. The city of Oslo voted 192,311 votes to 15,419 for its abolition.

Boy Mayor Given Few Pointers by Governor Smith

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—(United News)—A beattific smile on the face of the Tammany tiger belies the unrest inside.

New York's famous democratic political machine is deeply disappointed with the activities of Jimmy Walker.

The "boy mayor," as Tammany's choice for city hall has come to be called, has been severely censured by the sachems of the Fourteenth street wigwam. Jimmy has promised to be good, but he is a gayhearted young man, one who is likely, at the first tap of the snare drum, to reach for his jaunty silk hat and wasp-waisted overcoat and "step out."

With the increasing congestion in New York City emphasizing the demand for more subways and a dozen or more pressing municipal problems calling for the youthful burgo-master's consideration, there is a growing apprehension over Mayor Walker's predilection for night clubs, prizefights and the good things of life.

Governor "Al" Smith, now busily engaged in his fourth campaign for an office he would relinquish gladly if party politics permitted, has spoken harshly and characteristically out of the side of his mouth, to his "political godson."

"Cut out the jazz and get to work and make good on the party promises," said "Al" to "Jimmy," in effect.

Whether or not the mayor resented outspoken criticism from the man, who, singlehanded, put him in power, it is a fact that in Tammany circles, when patronage is discussed Walker goes to George Olvane, the grand sachem, for advice—but not to "A" Smith.

An election campaign is in progress and so the Tammany tiger smiles beatifically and hides its hurts.

Hurricane Invades Yucatan Channel, Is Latest Report

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 19.—(United News)—For the second time since the disastrous hurricane of September 18, Miami feared another storm tonight.

A tropical storm of increasing intensity was reported advancing northward from the Caribbean today.

Police stopped street clamor of newsmen who shouted hurricane warnings as evening papers carried weather bureau bulletins of the storm's progress.

Hundreds of persons made anxious queries at newspaper offices and at the weather bureau.

The storm was expected to traverse Yucatan channel tonight and the weather bureau advised that it would not be within striking distance of the Florida coast for 24 hours. Indications are that it will sweep into the Gulf of Mexico, it was said.

HAVANA, Oct. 19.—(United News)—Western Cuba tonight was preparing for the hurricane expected to reach the provinces of Pinar del Rio, Havana and Matanzas some time before daybreak Wednesday.

The national observatory reported Tuesday afternoon that the storm was advancing rapidly toward the southern coast of Cuba, traveling in a northeasterly direction. All coastwise and fishing boats put into the nearest shelter to wait calm weather.

The Dollar line steamship President Hays, en route from New York to San Francisco via the Canal Zone, took the roundabout eastern route from Havana to the Canal Zone, passing around Cape Maisi and through the Windward passage in order to avoid the hurricane.
