

West Palm Beach Suffers Damage Result Hurricane

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Oct. 20.—(United News)—Reports from Miami at 11 p. m. told of a heavy rain and a gale of about 55 miles per hour, but no presence of an actual hurricane.

Miami further reported a rising barometer in Key West as the center of the hurricane moved eastward into the Gulf stream.

The Palm Beach Radio company received the following report at 10:45 p. m.

"Tropical disturbance centered 24 1/2 north latitude by 81 west longitude, with winds moving north-east."

Only one telephone wire connected. Palm Beach and Miami tonight, but telegraph companies reported no trouble on their lines.

Streets are cleared in Miami. Extra police are stationed about the city. Many prisoners have been released from the city and county jails so that they may care for their families.

The United Fruit steamer Ulua is safe, but the gunboats Hautey and Fourth of February are aground in the harbor.

More than 15 schooners are ashore and the fate of their crews is unknown.

It was believed today that the hurricane reached its greatest fury at 5:37 o'clock last night.

Falls and a lot of traffic is still coming over the roads."

"As far as the oiling program, I doubt if it is completed this year, although we have had the oiling machines, and the materials ready for nearly a month," the park head remarked. "Just when the roads get dry enough to oil, then the rain comes along and we have to wait for another week before they are dry. It may be possible to complete the program in the spring, although it would be more satisfactory if this could be done before winter."

At one time the snow was blocking all traffic from Government Camp on into the park and tourists and parties wishing to view the crater in all its beauty of winter, were forced to walk with great difficulty from the camp. Rain soon melted all snow and the roadway is now clear to the rim. The lodge has been closed for some time and all activities have ceased, although the park itself is open.

SPECIAL ELECTION NOTICE

Pursuant to the terms and provisions of Section 3892, Oregon Laws, resolution of the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, duly passed pursuant to Ordinance Number 554, and pursuant to the said Ordinance Number 554, which was enacted and passed by the Common Council, July 18, 1921, and approved by the Mayor on said date, and entitled:

"An ordinance to provide for the carrying into effect in the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, the initiative and referendum powers reserved to the legal voters of municipalities by Section 1a of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and to enact and amend their municipal charters reserved to the legal voters of cities and towns by Section 2 or Article XI of the Constitution of said State."

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on Tuesday, November 2, 1926, a special general municipal election will be held in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors thereof, for their approval or rejection, the following ordinance, which was duly enacted, adopted and passed by the Common Council on September 27, 1926:

"ORDINANCE NO. 811 AN ORDINANCE CALLING A SPECIAL GENERAL ELECTION IN THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, KLAMATH COUNTY, OREGON, ON TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 2, 1926, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY THE QUESTION OF AMENDING SECTION 183 OF THE CHARTER OF SAID CITY INCREASING THE ANNUAL TAX LEVY FROM NOT TO EXCEED ONE QUARTER OF A MILL UPON EACH DOLLAR OF THE AS-

SESSED VALUE OF THE TAXABLE PROPERTY OF SAID CITY TO NOT EXCEED TWO MILLS UPON EACH DOLLAR OF THE ASSESSED VALUE OF THE TAXABLE PROPERTY OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON. THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That a special general election is hereby called to be held in the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, State of Oregon, on Tuesday, November 2, 1926.

Section 2. That at said election the following amendment or addition to the charter of the said city shall be submitted to the qualified electors for their approval or rejection, said amendment to take the place of Section 183 of said charter of said city. Said amendment to be submitted is as follows, to-wit:

"Section 183. The City of Klamath Falls by and through the City Council may, for the purpose of maintaining or assisting a Public Library, annually levy a tax not to exceed two (2) mills upon each dollar of the assessed value of the taxable property of the City of Klamath Falls, the proceeds of which shall be credited to the Public Library Fund, subject to order of the Klamath Falls Public Library Board."

Section 3. That the said charter amendment set forth hereinbefore shall bear the following ballot title, to-wit:

A PROPOSED AMENDMENT To the Charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, submitted to the legal voters of said city for their approval or rejection at the regular municipal election to be held on Tuesday, November 2, 1926, proposed by the Common Council under Ordinance No. 811, adopted by the Common Council on September 27, 1926, approved

by the Mayor on September 27, 1926.

Charter Amendment—Referred the legal voters by the Common Council. Submitted by Common Council—Proposed amendment to Sec. 183 providing for the increasing of the tax levy from one-quarter of a mill to two mills upon each dollar of the assessed value of the taxable property in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, for public library purposes.

102 Yes Vote Yes or No. 103 No Ordained by the Common Council. That Section 182, Article VI, Chapter IV, of the charter of the City of Klamath Falls be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

"Chapter IV, Article VI. Section 183. The City of Klamath Falls, by and through the City Council, may, for the purpose of maintaining or assisting a Public Library, annually levy a tax not to exceed two (2) mills upon each dollar of the assessed value of the taxable property of the city of Klamath Falls, the proceeds of which shall be credited to the Public Library Fund, subject to order of the Klamath Falls Public Library Board."

Section 4. That the Police Judge be and he hereby is authorized and directed to take the necessary and proper steps to call said special general election to enable electors to vote upon said proposed amendment."

Said election will be held and conducted and the returns thereof filed as provided by law, and the rolls will be opened at the hour of eight o'clock a. m., and close at the hour of eight o'clock p. m., on said November 2, 1926.
