

Major Leagues to Have New Pilots; Surprises Fandom

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—(United News)—New managers for at least six major league baseball clubs is a prospect which should provide plenty of fuel for winter stove league sessions.

Three clubs, two in the National league and one in the American, have already dropped their pilots of 1926. Replacing these managers probably will involve changes on several other clubs.

Stuffy McInnis, who once starred as first baseman for the old Athletics, and who was a dominant figure in turning the tide of the 1925 world series in favor of the Pittsburgh Pirates, has been named to succeed Art Fletcher in charge of the Phillies.

Although he is past 36, McInnis said he would act as a playing manager. He signed a two-year contract at \$12,500 a year, and baseball men wish him well. "Stuffy" knows as much as any man in the game about keeping up a team's morale, and his years of experience in the major leagues qualify him as a first-rate manager.

The case of Dave Bancroft, leader of the Boston Braves, is attracting the interest of fans throughout the country, for several clubs are aniling for Dave's services. Boston is more than reluctant to let him go. Yet the Braves finished as close as possible to the bottom of the National league.

Brooklyn in Bad Shape
Brooklyn's baseball club is torn with dissension and it is by no means certain that "Uncle" Wilbert Robinson will again pilot the Robins.

As soon as the Brooklyn magnates straighten out their personal differences, decide who is to be "compromise" president, etc., they may turn their attention to next year's team.

Successors to Bill McKeechie and George Sisler, managers already sacked since the season closed, may be named at any time. There was some talk of Fletcher going to Pittsburgh and even a rumor that Lee Fohl, manager of the Red Sox, would succeed McKeechie.

Red Sox on Alert
In the latter eventuality the Red Sox would, of course, be looking for a new boss. Sisler, if the Boston club could afford him, would be an ideal man. Anything that happened to the Red Sox would be an improvement.

Pittsburgh, however, has the baseball material to warrant the best manager Barney Dreyfuss can procure. In the National league presumably, the following will be retained at their managerial jobs:

Jack Hendricks, who nearly brought the Reds home a winner; Joe McCarthy, who did so unexpectedly well with the Cubs; Rogers Hornsby, manager of the world's champions, and, of course, John J. McGraw, who is more than a manager to the New York Giants.

American League Changes
In the American league two or three managerial changes are in the offing. Phil Hall has discharged George Sisler. Lee Fohl's future is uncertain. Ty Cobb has the matter of a new contract to talk over with the Detroit management.

Presumably these men are sure of their jobs:
Cornelius McGillicuddy, Miller Huggins, Tris Speaker, Eddie Collins, whose White Sox already are figuring on the 1927 pennant, and Stanley Harris.

Klamath to See Professionals in Fast Ball Game

Klamath county ball fans will have the opportunity of witnessing a real game of ball Sunday, October 21, when the National American and Pacific Coast league, all stars, will play on the Klamath diamond.

Announcement of the forthcoming game was made yesterday afternoon by E. D. Felt, manager and promoter of the barnstorming players. Felt resides in Dunsmuir and is interested in the real estate and insurance game there. Previously he played with the American League in Philadelphia, and with the Seals of the Coast League.

Two of the prominent players are Tony Lazzeri, who played second base with the Yanks, and Doughty, famous outfielder with the St. Louis Cards, will be among the players to come into Klamath Falls.

Doughty was injured in the fourth game of the World Series, he and Hafey, Card outfielder, colliding back of second base, when they both went after a fly. The injury to Doughty's shoulder prevented his further participation in the series and Holm replaced him as the lead-off man in the batting order.

The players will have the backing of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, and the Klamath ball fans, it was assured Felt.

Felt promoted a game in Dunsmuir two years ago in which "Babe" Ruth, famous New York Giant outfielder, played before a capacity grandstand.

Klamath Falls and Medford are the only cities in southern Oregon that the barnstorming ball players will visit, although they will play a few games in Dunsmuir followed by a series in the Sacramento Valley.

Jimmy Walker of New York Must Be Home by 3 A. M.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—(United News)—Mayor "Jimmy" Walker, who likes a night club as well as the next man, saw his 3 a. m. curfew law slide quietly through the upper branch of the municipal assembly Thursday.

While there were good grounds for believing that his honor wished secretly that the course of his measure should not be quite smooth there was nothing to be done about it.

"Jimmy" appeared even to have forgotten about its existence until someone called his attention to it.

Unless the bill is blocked by the board of aldermen, it will come back to the mayor for his signature, and after January 1, 1927, all night clubs and cabarets must close promptly at 3 a. m.

A year's imprisonment, and a fine of \$500 are provided for offenders.

Special dispensation may be granted by the license commissioner on New Year's eve, election day, etc. Since he drew up the curfew law, declaring that the spectacle of early rising workmen confronted with night club patrons in full dress and broad daylight, bred socialism, Mayor Walker hasn't spoken so enthusiastically on the subject.

In the first place, he enjoys the night club himself. In the second, Tammany hall has been muttering protests against the curfew. There is revenue in the early morning hours and the compulsory closing at 3 a. m. will interfere with certain forms of business.

HEAD OF PAN MOTOR LEAVES PENITENTIARY

LEAVENWORTH, Kans., Oct. 21.—(United News)—Samuel Pandolfo, former head of the defunct Pan Motor company of St. Cloud, Minn., was released from the federal prison here today where he has been serving a sentence for violation of the federal penal code covering sale of stock by mail.

High Calibre Men in Football Not Found This Year

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—(United News)—Although the 1926 football season is not far advanced, those who deplored the tendency to emphasize individual performances instead of team play already are congratulating themselves upon the apparent fact that there is no "Red" Grange in college football this year.

No one star player stands out so that his every move is recorded, as was the case with the youngster from Wheaton.

The east has not yet developed an individual of the prominence of "Swede" Gierlander, who ran wild in a green Dartmouth Jersey last fall.

The reporting of college football games thus far this year seems to have followed probably unconsciously the wishes of those who would have emphasis placed upon the performance of a team as a whole rather than upon the play of one outstanding star.

"It's a good thing if it keeps up," said Bill Roper, Princeton coach. "Last year, from some accounts, you would have thought Jake Stagle was the only player on our team."

Tad Jones, Yale's mentor, is another who is glad to hear that he has a team rather than a collection of stars. Jones is worrying just at present over how to convince the Eli eleven that it is rotten so that the players will not jeopardize their chances in the Brown game next Saturday through over confidence.

There have been feats of individual brilliancy, of course, but they have not been sustained to the extent of making any one player the outstanding football figure of the country.

When Bob McGinnis, who had waited three years for his chance, stole a Dartmouth pass, and then threw one of his own which turned the tide and won the game for Yale, he was conspicuous. But no one would have ticketed him the greatest player on the field last Saturday.

Schneider of Furman intercepted a Georgia pass and ran 97 yards for a touchdown last week, while Grube of Lafayette kicked a 45-yard goal against Dickinson, but next week, it will be some one else who will be getting measured for a laurel halo.

Benny Friedman of Michigan may prove the outstanding star of the middle west, but there is still lots of room on the tentative All-American list.

Yale seemed to have found a great back in Caldwell, only to have him break his ankle and become an invalid for the rest of the season.

Abalone Hunting Would Keep Local Sportsmen Active

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 21.—(United News)—Abalone hunting is the latest diversion of those whose penchant is for sports piscatorial. The beaches of the Pacific are being combed for this member of the bi-valve family which is in such demand that more persons have violated game laws recently searching for the abalone than for any other kind of game.

The abalone is found clinging to rocks along the seashore and is highly prized for its multi-colored shell.

The game laws that govern the abalone hunter are very strict, according to O. M. Thurston, head of the game law enforcement division of the country forestry department. It is a violation of the law to pry them from the rocks and they must be caught for food.

The hunter must dive for them and they must be alive and still in the shell when brought ashore. Size and color also is a factor. The red ones must measure seven inches in diameter; the green ones six and one-half inches, the pink ones six inches and the black ones five inches.

But with all the taboos placed on abalone hunting it is flourishing and now supplants the famous grunion hunting as a Pacific coast sport.

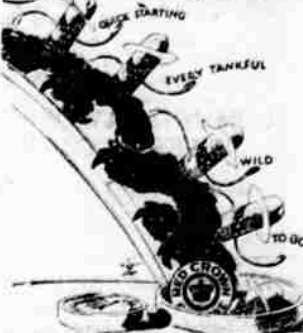
