YOUR DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Duke of Brabant To Wed Princess Thursday Next

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 30.—(United Press)—A modestly dressed young man arrived today from Brussels to marry a pretty Swedish girl next Thursday and the interest of all Europe was accorded his arrival, because the man will be king of the Belgians some day, and Princess Astrid, his fiancée, queen.

Alexis, duke of Brabant, lieutenant of the first regiment of Belgian grenadiers, was incognito and looked much the same today as he did six years ago when he visited the United States with his parents, King Albert and Queen Elizabeth, except that the uniform which he wore then had been supplanted by ordinary business clothes.

The duke will celebrate his twenty-fifth birthday next Wednesday, the day before he is married.

Princess Astrid has never visited the United States, but she is well known there, principally because there was gossip about eight months ago of her marriage to the prince of Wales.

When, then, Leopold was courted his sweetheart, but she the gossip knew nothing of that. Astrid also was born in November and on November 17, she will celebrate her twenty-first birthday. Her father is Prince Oscar, duke of Vestrogothia, and her mother was Princess Ingeborg of Denmark before her marriage.
