SUICIDE ESTABLISHED IN DEATH PORTLAND WOMAN

PORTLAND, Nov. 11.—(United News)—Suicide was the cause of the death of Miss Ethel Young, 40. It was said at the coroner's office here.

The body of Miss Young was found last week hanging from the rafters of her home at 655 East 18th street Portland. It was hanging suspended from a rafter by a sheet which was knotted about her neck.

So far as is known she had no relatives in Oregon.

Her health was thought to have been the cause.

Goddard, Mayor of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, by virtue of the authority in me vested by Ordinance 554, filed in the office of the Police Judge of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on July 18, 1921, entitled "An Ordinance providing for the manner of exercising by the people of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the initiative and referendum powers reserved to the legal voters of municipalities by Section 1 and Section 1 (a) of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and to enact and amend their municipal charters reserved to legal voters of cities and towns by Section 2 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon," do hereby proclaim that Ordinance Number 780 duly adopted by the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and referred to the people by the referendum process, received the requisite majority vote, to-wit: 1878, the negative vote, or the vote against the same being 973, and the said Ordinance thereby became and was adopted by the people of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and I do hereby proclaim the same as having been adopted; and

I do hereby further proclaim that Ordinance Number 748, duly adopted by the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and referred to the people by the referendum process, received the requisite majority vote, to-wit: 1379, the negative vote, or the vote against the same being 1332, and the said Ordinance thereby became and was adopted by the people of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and I do hereby proclaim the same as having been adopted; and

I do hereby further proclaim that the proposed amendment to Section 183 of the Charter of Klamath Falls, Oregon, providing for a decreasing of the tax levy from one-fourth (1/4) of a mill to two (2) mills upon each dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of said city, for public library purposes, duly carried, the vote for the adoption of said proposed amendment being 1551, and the vote against the adoption of said proposed amendment being 1016, and I do hereby proclaim the said proposed charter amendment as having been adopted; and

I do hereby further proclaim that the measure for a tax levy for the maintenance of the city public library, duly carried, the vote for the adoption of said measure being 1582, and the vote against the adoption of said proposed measure being 1135, and I do hereby proclaim the same as having been adopted and carried; and

I do hereby further proclaim that the measure for a tax levy for an additional tax for the city library, to cover salaries, books, and the like, duly carried, the vote for the adoption of said measure being 1570, and the vote against the adoption of said measure being 1078, and I do hereby proclaim the same as having been adopted and carried.

I, the Mayor, hereby further proclaim that the said proposed referendum measures, amendments and the like, as hereinbefore listed, received the requisite number of votes as hereinbefore mentioned, and that those receiving the highest number of votes in each case were the referendum and other measures passed and carried.

That the said measures having received a majority of all the votes cast at said election, and it appearing from the canvass of such votes that they received a majority of affirmative votes, I, the Mayor aforesaid, hereby proclaim that said referendum and other measures have been duly adopted by the qualified voters and electors of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

CORN CROP SHOWS DECREASE IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—(United News)—Corn production in the United States will be 2,693,963,000 bushels, compared to a crop of 2,905,053,000 bushels in 1925, the agriculture department stated today.

The quality of the corn crop was forecast at 73.36 per cent of normal. Corn yield per acre was placed at 26.7 bushels, compared with 28.6 bushels last year.

Buckwheat production was placed at 15,249,000 bushels, compared with 14,542,000 bushels last year. The quality of buckwheat was estimated at 82.2 per cent of normal and the yield per acre at 19 bushels.

Flaxseed production was estimated at 18,775,000 bushels compared with 22,018,000 in 1925. The crop's quality was placed at 85.6 per cent of normal and the yield per acre at 66.8 bushels.

MEXICAN HUNTERS SHOOT MAN BY MISTAKE

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 11.—(United News)—Three Mexicans wanted for the shooting of Deputy M. Huntington, of Lancaster, were rounded up by a sheriff's posse late yesterday, and held for investigation.

The Mexicans, Bernardo Music, Manuel Fouca, and Sam Roselli, told Captain Bright, of the sheriff's homicide detail, that the shooting was accidental.

Music, they said, fired the shot, intended for a rabbit while the trio was hunting this morning in Antelope valley.
