Bill Lee Named Vice-President State Assessors

The annual session of the State association of county assessors came to an end here at Medford Wednesday evening with the selection of Oregon City as the next meeting place and the election of W. B. Cook of Clackamas county as president; W. T. Lee, Klamath county, vice president, and F. J. Holman, Polk county, secretary.

Two resolutions were adopted, the first requesting the legislature to name a special tax commission in 1929 to revise the entire state tax and assessment code. The assessors allege there are a number of contradictions, inconsistencies and ambiguities in the present assessment code, and a thorough revision is greatly needed. The matter will not be brought up at the coming session of the legislature, but in 1929. Assessor Hiram U. Welch and his deputy, E. F. Hackaby, of Portland, were named as the committee to present the resolution to the state legislature.

The second resolution asks the state tax investigation commission to introduce into the 1927 session of the legislature a bill defining ocean-going vessels engaged in passenger or freight, coast or foreign trade. The resolution is designed to clear up doubt as to just what vessels are ocean-going and what are not, so that assessments may be made accordingly.

Dr. Marie Stopes Grows Sarcastic With Archbishop

LONDON, Nov. 12. (United News)—Not only unrepentant but angrily resentful, Dr. Marie Stopes, pioneer birth control advocate, has lashed out heartily in a statement against her most prominent critics.

"Conceived in ignorance, born in squalor, reared amid the direst poverty under conditions that would not give a pig a fair chance of reaching healthy maturity, many of the unwanted children of slumdom are compelled from the start to swell the ranks of the unemployed, lunatics and criminals," she said. "Would it have been in the interests of the community if their suffering mothers had been given a little advice which could have prevented this misery?"

"In some cases I have known babies to be brought into the world under conditions that would not be tolerated by a farmer for his cattle, yet where human beings are concerned we hear stupid criticism of birth control."

"I am content to leave it to the future to decide whether an honest attempt to prevent such evils is lamentable, mischievous, dangerous, or harmful."

The epithets described by Dr. Stopes were those applied by the Archbishop of Canterbury, head of the Church of England, and one of her critics, to her work.

"We who favor birth control believe that the haphazard production of children by ignorant, coerced, or diseased mothers is profoundly detrimental to the race," she continued.

"We believe that parenthood should no longer be the result of ignorance or accident, but should be a power used voluntarily and with knowledge."

"We are profoundly and fundamentally a pro-baby organization, in favor of producing the largest possible number of healthy, happy children without detriment to the mother and with the minimum wastage of infants by premature death."

"We have our own birth control clinics, but we believe that governmental health officers should be instructed to give mothers information and instruction regarding birth control."

Author Shaw Gets Noble Prize For Best Literature

LONDON, Nov. 12. (United News)—George Bernard Shaw informed today that he had won the Nobel prize for literature written in 1925 remarked characteristically that while he had written nothing that year he would enjoy spending the \$31,200 that the prize carries with it.

"I can hardly believe it," Shaw said. "As far as I recall the prize is awarded for what is considered the best work of the year, but I wrote nothing. Perhaps that is the reason I won."

"I suppose now I will receive hundreds of appeals from charities asking help. They will be disappointed, for I intend to spend it all on pure self-indulgence."

Soviets Extend No Help Warring Chinese Factions

SHANGHAI, China. (By Mail to United News)—Nov. 12.—"The soviet government of Russia has not given a single kopeck to the warring factions of China, nor has it sent a single bullet or shell to assist any faction concerned in the present civil war," said M. Kharkhan, soviet minister to China, when he was in Shanghai recently.

"Although we sympathize with the national aspirations of this great oriental power, we are not in a position to aid it, for Moscow needs money worse than does China," he added.

The Russian representative admitted that trade unions of Russia have helped British trade unions during the coal strike, but this, he said, was not inspired by a governmental policy.

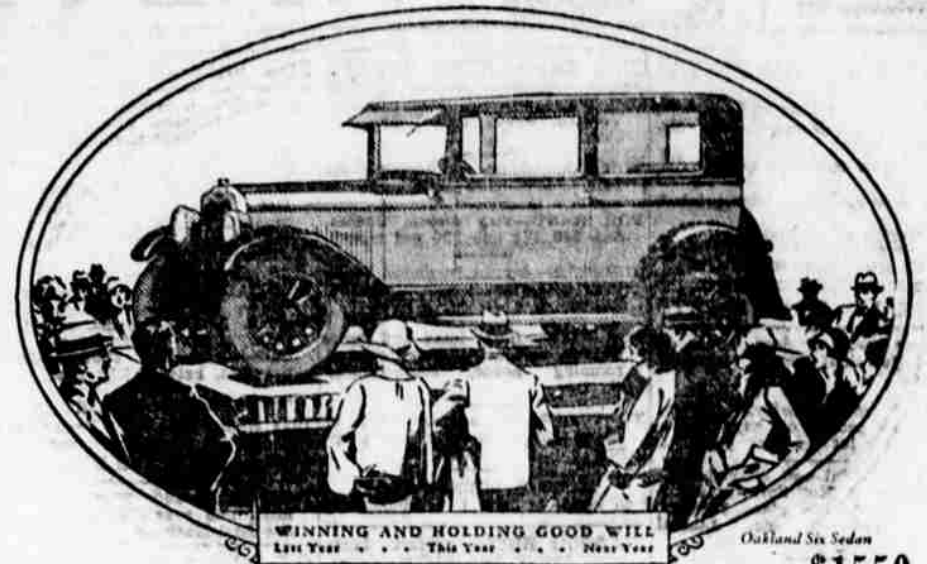
"We have taken the first step in furthering China's national des-

ires by voluntarily relinquishing our extra-territorial rights, and 100,000 Russians are living and doing business under Chinese laws in the Celestial Empire," he said.
