

Liquor Offenders Enter Guilty Plea In Emmitt's Court

Jim Titus, who was arrested by prohibition officers last week with a large quantity of moonshine in his car, pleaded guilty before Justice Emmitt yesterday to possession of liquor, after reclining a week in the county jail.

Justice Emmitt gave Titus a fine of \$500 and costs of which \$350 was paid into court. The balance Titus promised the judge within the coming few days. The veteran justice committed Titus to the sheriff until the money was turned into court.

The case of Myrtle Fouts, charged with possession of liquor, will be continued until November 24 at 10 o'clock, according to Justice Emmitt yesterday.

Another court scene was enacted yesterday when Betty Parker, charged with possession of a quarter pint of intoxicating liquor in her icebox, pleaded not guilty to the charge and furnished bond of \$400.

The raid occurred Armistice Day at Betty's house, 429 Commercial street. Along with the liquor, four whiskey glasses, a pitcher, a funnel and one gallon copper tank were confiscated by the prohib.
