THOUSANDS OF ACRES TO BE OPENED FOR SETTLEMENT

PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—(United News)—The next step in the new water distribution plan for the waters of the McKay reservoir will be the opening of 10,000 acres of land for settlement in the Westland and Hermiston projects. It was announced Friday by W. G. Ide, manager of the state chamber of commerce.
Prices ranging from \$40 to \$50 per acre for unimproved land and from \$75 to \$150 per acre for improved land have been decided upon.

Advertising Man Wide Acquaintance Dead in Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—(United News)—Thomas A. Cusack, pioneer in outdoor advertising, and the man who helped fence the United States with signboards, died from pneumonia after a three days' illness.
Born in County Clare, Ireland, 68 years ago, Cusack came to this

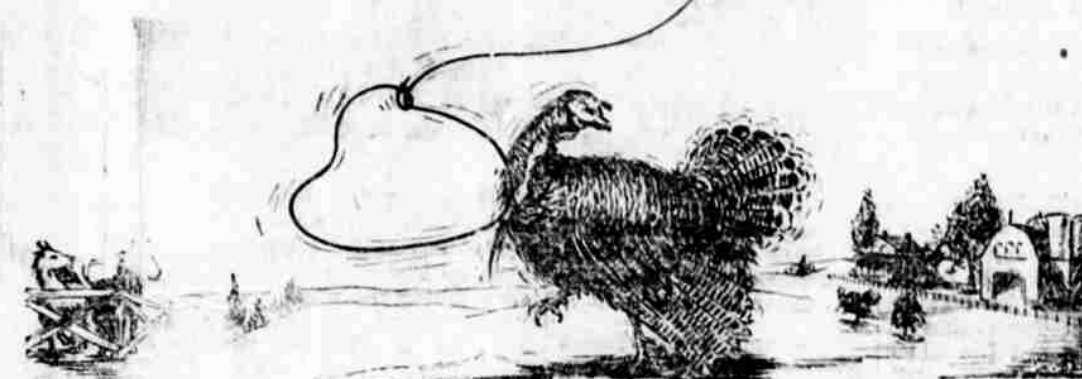
