

Football Underdogs Fight It Out; Yale Wins By Score 12-7

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 20.—(United Press)—The two underdogs of football's once famous big three fought it out today before a crowd of 77,000 and Yale beat Harvard 12 to 7.

For both teams it has been a disastrous season, defeats by Princeton, following on the heels of other setbacks. There was to be a booby prize handed out at the conclusion of this afternoon's game and neither eleven wished it.

But the superior play of Captain Bunnell's men made itself felt and Harvard once more fell from gridiron grace.

For a brief time the Crimson led the Blue. That was in the third period, when, by as beautiful a forward pass as ever featured a football game, Harvard assumed a lead of 7 to 6. But Yale would not give in and two goals from the field changed the story.

That the Southern Pacific will early the coming year begin work on the extension of the Modoc Northern railroad with Alturas as the destination, is no longer disputed, despite the announcement made a few days ago that this proposed line will be abandoned in the event the Northern lines are permitted to invade this country and thus divide the business that naturally follows in the wake of our great lumber industry.

Southern Pacific must have an outlet to the east and the logical way out is to build to Alturas and then follow the line of Nevada, California and Oregon to Wendell, where connection is made for Reno. Southern Pacific recently took over the N. C. & O. through permission from the Interstate Commerce commission, and rail equipment is being assembled at various points which will permit of the hurried extension of the Modoc Northern to Alturas and work is expected to start next spring.

Situation Being Clarified With the railroad situation being clarified property owners and investors are naturally looking toward the future as it applies to Klamath Falls. More homes are needed; more business structures are essential, and more hotels must be provided. Therefore, it is only natural that this city should be experiencing a building program that will gain momentum until we will become recognized as the largest city in the state outside of Portland.

Manufacturing Industries will follow in the wake of prosperity. New settlers will locate in our midst and our farming, stock raising and dairying industries will naturally expand. Our soil is so abundantly rich that agriculture will widen. Truck gardening and poultry raising, rabbit breeding, and a score or more of other industries will be placed on a solid foundation.

Homes, Hotels Needed With all this activity so rampant in Klamath Falls and Klamath county, it will naturally follow that more homes and hotels will have to be provided. Callahan likes to stand back and pop the boys when they rush in, and Herman likes to rush in. Regardless of the outcome, it should be worth the price.

The clash between Cyclone Williams and Pat McFadden will be enlivened by the desire of the former to step out of the four-round class and be classed a semi-windup batter.

Those who saw him on the last card know he has real ability as a mitt-slinger and feel the result should be nothing less than one of the best scraps ever staged here.

Kid Rider and Jackie Goodman will perform in a four-round preliminary.

Rider has gotten away with three wins but is not expected to continue the string when he meets Goodman.

Michigan Retains Football Standing for Middlewest

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—(United News)—The Wolverines of Michigan this afternoon retained the big ten football conference of the middle west, winning from Minnesota 7 to 6, and thus completing their conference schedule without defeat.

Northwestern Wildcats likewise finished their schedule without a defeat, beating Iowa 13 to 6, but because they had an easier schedule and Michigan was 1925 champion, most followers of the game conceded the title to Michigan.

Ardent Northwestern partisans will insist, however, that their schedule was as difficult as they were able to book, and that the Wildcats should be given a tie for the title. The big ten doesn't permit play-offs and so the question will also remain controversial.

Ohio State Walks Away With Honors from U. Illinois

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Nov. 20.—(United News)—One week ago today Meyer Clark missed a drop kick which cost Ohio State university a 17 to 17 tie with Michigan, a tie which might have put Ohio State into a tie for the big ten conference championship.

Today Clark made a drop kick that beat the University of Illinois 7 to 6, and it was Forrest "Frosty" Peters, the Illinois halfback, whose dropkick beat Pennsylvania three weeks ago who failed to plant the ball between the bars here today for the point which would have given Illinois a tie with the great Ohio team.

Stanford Sweeps To Coast Victory For Championship

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 20.—(U. P.)—Stanford University swept to its first Pacific Coast football championship this afternoon, overwhelming the University of California before 80,000 spectators, 41 to 6.

Stanford scored two touchdowns in the first quarter, two more in the second period and a final brace in the last quarter. The game was played on a muddy field, frequent fumbles being due to the slippery ball.

California put across its lone touchdown in the second period after a Card fumble had been recovered.

Michigan Takes Jug for Sixth Time in Contest

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 20.—(United News)—The little brown jug was given back into the keeping of Captain Friedman of Michigan tonight, and he accepted it modestly as he kicked the point after touchdown that gave Michigan its sixth consecutive victory over Minnesota today by a 7 to 6 score.

COLUMBIA COLLEGE VICTOR OVER SEATTLE COLLEGE

PORTLAND, Nov. 20.—(United Press)—Running roughshod over the Seattle College eleven, Columbia college closed its 1926 season with a decisive 33 to 0 victory in Multnomah civic stadium this afternoon.

MAROONS DEFEATED BY WISCONSIN 14 TO 7 CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—(United News)—Coach A. A. Stagg's Maroons completed the worst season in their history this afternoon, when they fell before Wisconsin 14 to 7 and thus finished the year without scoring a single conference victory.

Never before, excepting in 1918 when the war and the E. A. T. C. were blamed for a season without a triumph on the gridiron, had Chicago finished without even one consoling victory, or even at least one tie game among all its encounters with conference teams.
