Austrians To Get Hearing Nov. 29 Before B. Thomas

Theodore Cristch, Mike Maras and Joe Holsea, charged with conspiracy to violate a federal statute, and four other charges of equally serious nature, will be given their second hearing before United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas on November 29 at 10 o'clock. Maras was released on \$1,500 cash bonds, but his brother Austrians were committed to the county jail.

The trio was arrested by federal, county and state prohi officers on Main street, Wednesday noon. Their initial hearing before Thomas was dismissed on the grounds that the government had failed to specify that the liquor was intoxicating.

New Long Distance Line to Northwest for Early Future

Toward the close of January cities in Oregon and Washington will have direct telephone connection with Chicago and the east through Spokane. According to H. M. Durston, division commercial superintendent of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company at Portland, construction crews now are building the transmission line from Spokane westerly at a cost of approximately \$250,000. The first trans-continental telephone line to San Francisco was opened for service in 1915, and the second line to Los Angeles was completed two years ago. Conversations between Portland and Chicago are now routed through San Francisco. The long distance lines are heavily patronized for commercial needs. With branch and intermediate lines this service will cover a wider range, Durston says.

FIFTH CASE SMALLPOX REPORTED THIS VICINITY

The fifth case of smallpox to be reported within the last two weeks in Klamath Falls, has come to the notice of the Klamath county health unit, according to an announcement made yesterday by Dr. G. A. Newsom.

Although not serious, the case was considered sufficient to be placed in strict quarantine. The man is V. A. Shell 35, of 814 Oak street.

Dr. Newsom reported the rapid recovery of the other four smallpox patients at the Klamath county isolation hospital.

Sconchin Reposes In Portland Jail On Murder Charge

PORTLAND, Nov. 20.—(United Press)—Having been bound over to the federal grand jury on a charge of murder by United States Commissioner Bert Thomas at Klamath Falls, Guy Sconchin, Klamath Indian, was brought to Portland by Deputy United States Marshal Davidson to await the convening of the grand jury November 26.

He was lodged in the county jail without bail.

It is charged by the government that Sconchin, in a drunken brawl October 31 on the Klamath Indian reservation near Beatty, shot and killed McClelland Williams, another Indian. The United States attorney's office announced several eye witnesses to the alleged murder will be brought here to testify.

Two other prisoners, Richard Schutte, and Kenneth Moore also were brought here from Klamath Falls by Davidson. Both are charged separately, with the possession and introduction of liquor on the Klamath Indian reservation, and each was placed in jail in lieu of \$2,500 bail.

EUGENE, Nov. 21.—(Special)—Hundreds of men daily are seeking work at the government employment office here, and there is little call for help from camp or construction employers, according to F. L. Armitage, superintendent of the bureau. There is the usual run of migratory labor coupled with a large number of men that have been laid off from jobs owing to inclement weather and completion of construction projects. The condition is seasonal, although Mr. Armitage stated that it had come later this year. Good weather prevailed until the middle of this month, whereas in the past it has ended in October. December and January may be better months than November. Work is needed by a large number of men, especially many who live here and have families to support.

The Care and Preservation of Table Linens

Aside from its satiny surface and the interest of its myriad patterns, linen damask is additionally desirable for its wearing qualities. Given a reasonable amount of care, table cloths and napkins of finely woven linen will render a lifetime of satisfactory service.

All table linen not immediately needed should be laundered without starching and put away in a well-aired closet, wrapped in blue paper to prevent its turning yellow. To lengthen the life of table damask, repair the slightest hole and remove all stains before the article is washed. In the matter of stains it is essential that chemical eradicators as well as the spot itself be removed before laundering. Table linen should be washed with pure soap, dried in the sun and ironed while slightly damp to bring out the design. When folding, be sure that the creases are accurately spaced and absolutely straight.

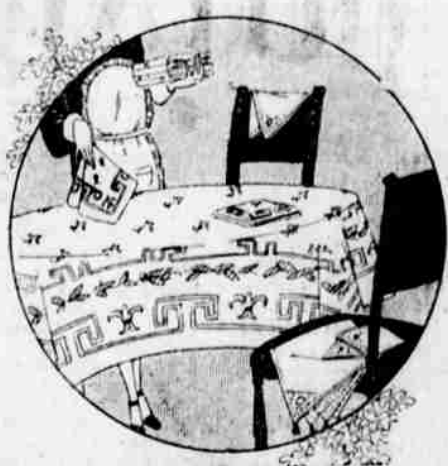
