

Michael McTigue Staging Comeback as Great Fighter

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—(United News)—The rejuvenation of Michael McTigue, the creaking Celt, is the first sensation of winter boxing.

Whether Mike has found the Fountain of Youth or has been monkeying with monkey glands, only the aging Irishman and his astute little manager, Jimmy Johnson, can say. But the fact remains that McTigue is a better fighter today than at any time in his career and must be reckoned with in light heavyweight circles.

A McTigue-Berlenbach bout should be one of the big fistic hits of the season, and there will be a lot of wise money upon the odds from the Emerald Isle. For Mike has grown aggressive—something those who only saw him when champion will never believe—Mike has decided his hands are not so brittle after all and has discovered a knockout wallop in his accurate right fist.

With Berlenbach back in the east looking for a lot of fighting, McTigue presents himself as the first candidate. Mike is due for a return bout with Jack Delaney, if he can dispose of Berlenbach and Tommy Loughran, while Berly himself might keep his weight down and attempt to regain his crown the Astoria Assassin, therefore, from the Bridgeport battler.

Tunney to Fight Out Trouble With Attorney General

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—(United News)—Gene Tunney, heavyweight champion, must settle his troubles with the attorney general of New York, the boxing commission decided Tuesday, admitting that it had called District Attorney Hamilton's attention to the facts that led to the champion's arrest on a charge of giving a boxing exhibition in a Broadway theatre not licensed for the purpose. The commission announced it could take no action to extricate Tunney from his difficulties.

The heavyweight champion once more was accused of deliberately seeking publicity by laying himself open to arrest when he, or his advisors, must have known that the state law forbids his boxing under the circumstances.

J. Humbert Fugazy, who seeks to rival Tex Rickard as a boxing promoter, and who is out to promote the next fight in which Tunney engages, was present at the commission meeting. He was more interested, however, in protecting his contract with Paul Berlenbach than in the troubles of the heavyweight champion.

Berlenbach asked the commission for release from a contract which binds him to fight for Fugazy and no one else. The boxer and his reinstated manager, Dan Hickey, asserted that the Italian promoter had no indoor fight club and

therefore was unjustly interfering with Paul's sole means of livelihood by depriving him of opportunities to fight in Madison Square Garden.

Fugazy hinted that he would have an "important announcement" regarding an indoor arena to make shortly, and the commission told all parties concerned to come back in a fortnight.

Earlier in the day Tunney was arraigned in West Side court on a charge of boxing in a theatre without proper license and the case was put over until Thursday.

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Building Program Fast Advancing in Town of Chiloquin

Building conditions are rapidly advancing and the large business blocks which are covering huge bare spaces on the main street of Chiloquin are fast coming to final construction.

The Richards building on Main street is now well under way and between showers, workmen on the Hirti building are putting in a window or nailing on a piece of lumber. It is probable that had the weather remained neutral, there would have been no time lost in the completion of the building which J. Hirti Jr., of Klamath Falls is putting up.

Six to eight building permits have been issued every week, the majority of them for first class houses in the reservation city.

Appraisal Water Works Committee Has Been Named

A committee has been appointed by the city council of Chiloquin to appraise the water works owned by A. C. Glesner, mayor of Chiloquin, who has recently offered to sell to the city of Chiloquin, the entire water works.

Jack Peppard, recently of Klamath Falls, and Carl Williams, both of Chiloquin were appointed on the committee and they will choose a third member in the immediate future. There is only one string tied to the proposition, and that is the third party must be disinterested.
