

Watch for Ethyl; She's Coming to Western States

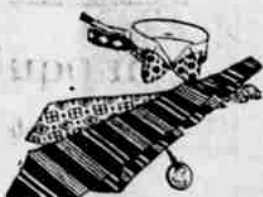
