

Boxing Trust is Denied by Rickard

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(United News)—Deaf that Tex Rickard has any intention of operating a "boxing trust" as suggested by his rival, Humbert J. Pugazy, comes from a spokesman for the promoter at Madison Square Garden.

Pugazy, in an interview with the United News, denounced Rickard's "corner" in heavyweight boxers and declared that the fight game was placed in jeopardy thereby.

"No one has done as much for boxing as Tex Rickard," the latter's spokesman retorted. "No one knows better than he how quickly anything of the sort suggested by Pugazy would reflect upon the good name of the sport."

Rickard, it was pointed out, is going ahead with permission of the state athletic commission, to arrange a series of fights whereby the best man to meet Gene Tunney for the heavyweight championship is to be chosen.

"If Tex is signing up boxers for bouts, it is because he is arranging the best possible matches for the public. He has a place to stage these bouts."

The boxing commission will be asked, however, to consider a ruling whereby, except under unusual circumstances, a fighter may not bind himself to one promoter for more than one match.

Pugazy, and those who "view with alarm" the monopoly on such fighters as Jimmy Maloney, Jack Sharkey, Paul Berlinbach and Harry Pearson, to say nothing of Paulino and Diener, which Rickard seeks for the Garden corporation, believe that a ruling of this kind would give all promoters a fair chance to arrange bouts.

Rickard, however, will resist any effort to restrict his contracts with the men he wants to fight for him this winter.

Mickey Walker is Recognized Champ

CHICAGO, Dec. 7. (United News)—Mickey Walker became the undisputed middleweight champion of the world today, when the Illinois boxing commission upheld Referee Henry Yanger's decision in the Walker-Flowers bout at the Coliseum last Friday night.

But after January 1 two judges will be at the ringside in addition to the referee, the boxing commission decided, in order to avoid the repetition of the storms of protest which followed Yanger's decision, and the stigma which was attached to that bout.

The judges-referee system of awarding decisions in vogue in New York state, will be given "a fair trial," the state body said.

Chiloquin Water System Appraised For Sale to City

The appraisal committee, including C. R. Williams, Jack Peppard and G. W. Brown, who were appointed by the city council recently to look into the purchase of the Chiloquin Water Works, reported their findings Monday night.

The amount was given at \$12,850 by the committee, according to reports, and it is probable that the city council will order the purchase of the water works from A. C. Glenger, owner, as well as mayor of Chiloquin.

The purchase of the Chiloquin Water Works by the city and made into a municipal affair, is one of the first steps toward the organization of Chiloquin into a real city.

It is probable that in the spring pipes will be laid down Main street and sent directly to residential districts. Water is obtained from the clear, cold waters of Williamson River.

Chiloquin Theatre to Cost \$50,000

Outstanding among all other new buildings in Chiloquin will be the proposed \$50,000 theatre to be erected next spring. This is according to C. W. Benson, manager of the Chiloquin theatre, who is spending a few days in Klamath Falls conferring with Harry W. Poole, who is to build the new theatre.

Plans for the major structure are now in the hands of Reed Brothers, San Francisco architects. The plans show a seating capacity of 700 people. The building, which is to be a thoroughly modern playhouse, is to be of steel and concrete construction.

Benson and Poole are already lining up 1927 attractions for both the Chiloquin theatre and the new show house. Erection of the new structure will mark another step in the admirable development program launched by various interests in the reservation city this past year.
