

### Presbyterians to Render Christmas Anthems Sunday

Members of the choir of the Presbyterian church are working hard on a fine program of Christmas anthems that will make up the Christmas musicale that is to be given at the church next Sunday evening at 7:30.

The entire evening is to be devoted to Christmas music and among the more noteworthy numbers that are to be presented, are the Sanctus and Benedictus from the famed St. Cecilia mass by Gounod.

On the program, which is under the supervision of Mrs. Ruth Akers Holloway, director of the choir, will be a vocal solo by Miss Jennie Grover of this city and now attending the Ashland Normal school.

Mrs. Eloise McIntyre, church organist, will play a special organ number of merit, as a part of the musicale. It is expected that over 20 voices will figure in the Christmas musicale.

### Three Mexicans to Serve Long Terms

Three Mexicans, who have used the Klamath country in which to peddle moonshine and the deadly Mexican opiate, marijuana, were given severe sentences by Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt when they pleaded guilty before him yesterday.

E. G. Soto and Juan Masise, who were arrested with a quantity of the opiate, and 24 pints of moonshine by Federal Officer Shriber and State Officer Short, appeared before Emmitt yesterday morning. Soto was given a fine of \$400 and costs and Masise, \$250 and costs. It was Masise, however, who had in his possession of the marijuana.

Richard Brocamonies, who was arrested last week while making a delivery to Southern Pacific construction gangs on Spring street by proli officers, was fined \$300 and costs on the charge of possession of liquor, and \$300 and costs, on the second charge of transportation. All three were committed to the county jail and their cars confiscated.

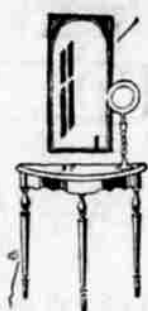

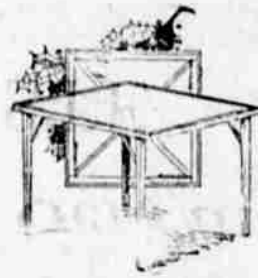

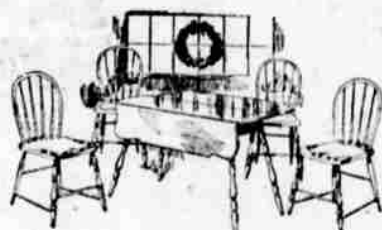
