

Delaney Knocks Out Bud Gorman

FOURTH REGIMENT Army, Jersey City, Dec. 20. (U.N.)—Jack Delaney, world's light heavyweight champion, knocked Bud Gorman of Wisconsin unconscious in the second round of their fight for charity before 10,000 rabid fight fans here Monday night.

The big heavyweight who had an advantage of 25 pounds in weight, took the count while hanging on the ropes, one minute and 35 seconds after the round started.

Gorman had been knocked down for a full count a few seconds before, and was unaware of what was going on as the French-Canadian, angered by a flow of blood which Bud drew from his nose in the first session, slashed away with trip-hammer blows which reduced the Wisconsin boxer to insensibility.

The result came as no surprise, although Gorman had put up an energetic fight in the opening round, and held his own with the title holder.

As Delaney went at his man in the second, smashing home a right to the jaw from which Gorman never recovered, one could picture him successfully combatting the best of the world's heavyweights. On the same card which was for the benefit of a Christmas fund, another world's champion, Charley "Phil" Rosenberg, king of the Santams, won easily in ten rounds from Pety Mack of Jersey City.

FERRARA TO FIGHT BASQUE WOOD CHOPPER

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 20.—Miguel Ferrara, said to be one of the most popular foreign heavyweights with American sports crowds has signed a contract to fight Paulino, the Basque wood chopper, in Madison Square Garden early in 1927.

After a fight in Havana early in January Ferrara will sail for New York, where he will arrive the first week in February.

The date of his fight in Madison Square Garden had not been fixed.

Rogers Hornsby is Traded to Giants

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. (U.N.)—Rogers Hornsby, who led the St. Louis Cardinals to their first world's series victory this year, has been traded to the New York Giants for Frankie Frisch and Jimmy Ring.

No money was involved in the trade, according to the announcement, made tonight by the secretary of the Giants.

Hornsby has managed for the Cardinals for the last two seasons, and was in the midst of a sticker for a new contract when the owners of the two clubs completed negotiations for the trade.

The trade is regarded as one of the biggest in major league baseball in recent years.

Hornsby, who is regarded as one of the most valuable second basemen in the National league, had been at loggerheads with his boss, Sam Breadon, president of the Cardinals, over a new contract. The player-manager was reported to be holding out for a three year contract at a salary of \$50,000 a year.

Frankie Frisch had made an enviable record for himself in the Giant infield, Jimmy Ring, although not as widely known as the other two principals in the trade, has been in the major league games for many years. He came to the Giants the year before last from Philadelphia.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 20. (U.N.)—Leo Lomski, the Aberdeen "assassin," and Tiger Flowers, former middleweight champion of the world, may meet in a ten-round bout here January 22, according to Dick Donald, local promoter.

Donald said he had been attempting to arrange the match between this pair for some time, and that he expected to come to terms with Flowers early this week. Lomski has already signed for the meeting, according to Donald.

Donald staged the Sailor Huffman-Flowers go last summer.

Delaney-Dempsey Fight is Possible

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. (U.N.)—"Jack Dempsey is too strong and can hit too hard," Gene Tunney, world's heavyweight champion, said today, in discussing the merits of a match between Dempsey, the former heavyweight champion, and Jack Delaney, the light heavyweight title holder.

Tex Rickard is supposed to have the match in the making for an early spring date in his Garden. Referring to Delaney, who is regarded as his foremost challenger, Tunney said he would be willing to meet him any time in any place where a promoter could arrange the bout.

"Delaney is a great fighter," he said. "He has everything but the weight and size."
