

### Election Wards Fully Outlined

Police Judge Lem L. Gaghagen has been asked to outline the five election wards within the boundaries of the City of Klamath Falls. While this outline may not be absolutely official, it is presumed that it is, as the outline has been made by predecessors. These boundaries are as follows:

**Ward 1** embraces all that area west of the river, including Riverside, West Klamath Falls and Lake-side Additions, together with that portion East of the River southwest of a line from the mouth of the canal, following a meandering line of the canal to the intersection of Tunnell street, north on Tunnell street to Oregon avenue, East on Oregon avenue to Lakeview street, and that portion west of Lakeview street from Oregon avenue to Upham street, south on Lakeview street to Upham, west on Upham street to Uerling street, south on Uerling to Ewauna avenue, southeasterly on Ewauna avenue to the lake shore, following the lake shore to a point immediately on the shore south of a direct line north and south from Main street in the center of Commercial street.

**Ward 2** embraces the area south and east from Ewauna avenue at the junction of Ewauna avenue and Uerling street, north on Uerling street to 7th street, southeasterly on 7th street to Commercial street, south on Commercial street to the lake shore, and in a meandering line on the lake shore to Ewauna avenue, and on Ewauna avenue to the place of beginning.

**Ward 3** embraces that area beginning at a point at the junction of 7th street and Uerling street, north to Upham street, east to Prospect street, following the canal to 11th street, 11th street to Commercial street, Commercial street to 7th street, the place of beginning.

**Ward 4** embraces that area beginning at the junction of 11th street with the Government Canal, following the canal in a meandering line to the S. P. railroad, north and west along the line of the railroad right of way to the City limits, East on Van Ness street to the center of the block one-half a block east of Pacific Terrace, directly southeast on a line intersecting Main street at the westerly approach of the Canal bridge, then East to the City limits, thence south to Shasta Way, thence west to the lake shore, thence north westerly in a meandering line along the lake shore to Commercial street to a line directly north and south in the center of Commercial street, north on Commercial street to the junction of Oak and 11th streets, northwesterly on 11th street to the place of beginning.

**Ward 5** embraces that area beginning at a point at the mouth of the Government canal in a meandering line to Tunnell street, north on Tunnell street to Oregon avenue, east on Oregon avenue to Lakeview street, south on Lakeview street to Upham street, east on Upham street to the canal, in a meandering line along the canal to the railroad right of way, along the railroad right of way northwesterly to Van Ness street or City limits, west on Van Ness street to Alma street, north on Alma street to Pelican street, west on Pelican street to California avenue, north on California avenue to the City limits, west on the city limits to the lake shore, thence following the lake shore south and east to the place of beginning.

The voting place for Ward 1 is at Mrs. Wilkin's home; Ward 2 is in the basement of the County Court House; Ward 3 in Slaters Bldg. on 7th street between Main and Klamath avenue; Ward 4 in the office of the Lake hotel; and Ward 5 in the basement of the Fairview school house (entrance from Worden Avenue).
