

Senator McKinley Protects Estranged Wife in His Will

URBANA, Ill., Dec. 20. (U. N.)—The late Senator William B. McKinley left \$100,000 to his widow, Mrs. Kate Frisbie, with whom he had not lived for many years.

His will, made public Monday, disclosed that the McKinley estate is worth considerable more than \$600,000, probably over \$1,000,000. This is small, however, considering that the late senator during his lifetime had made bequests to charitable and educational institutions totaling more than \$6,000,000.

The document, in a measure, disclosed the relationship between Senator McKinley and his wife, who had been an invalid for many years, and whose family, at the time of her marriage, was said to have been opposed to McKinley as a son in law, because of his comparative poverty.

McKinley explained the size of the estate he left his widow, by explaining in the will:

"To my wife, Kate F. McKinley, I bequeath \$100,000 in five per cent bonds, knowing, as I do, that she can legally claim much more, but also knowing she is just and fair, and I am satisfied that she will acquiesce in this disposition of my estate."

Railroad Business On Coast is Heavy

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 20. (U. N.)—The heaviest shipments ever recorded from California, Nevada and Arizona and Western New Mexico moved from those states during 1926, according to reports presented at the second annual meeting of the Pacific coast transportation advisory board.
