

Firemen's Dance To Be New Year's Night at Altamont

Proceeds from the dance are to go into a fund that the firemen are raising for additional equipment in their living quarters, namely a radio with which to shorten the long hours of their unending vigil.

Inland Company Burns Its Fingers

The Inland Construction company got its fingers burned when it took over the paving contracts of B. C. Seydel.

This was the reply received by the city yesterday from the concern that furnished the Inland company bonds, in response to a communication from City Clerk Gaghagen asking a statement of cause as to slow-down in completing the paving jobs.

Street improvement projects in question are Sargent and Crescent avenues, for whose paving the Inland Construction company now hold contracts. Both avenues were graded last fall and some rock was spread on the jobs, but progress is declared to be extremely slow and the city is now looking for assurance that the projects will be completed when weather permits resumption of paving next year.

Hit, Run Driver Gets Jail Sentence

Dean Upton, who changed his plea of not guilty to that of guilty on the charge of driving while intoxicated, was given a fine of \$250 and sentenced to 60 days in the city jail when he appeared before Justice R. A. Emmitt yesterday.

It was Upton who ran down John O'Day, his son, Bobbie, and his young daughter Saturday night, December 12 on Main street. The boy was taken to the Klamath Valley hospital where an X-ray examination proved a fractured skull had been sustained, and a delicate operation was immediately performed. The child is said to be improving at present.
