Alabama-Stanford Compete for Honor

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 31. (U. N.)—The rockstraw bed of the Arroyo Seco, site of the Rose bowl, will flow with life once again tomorrow, when a Crimson Tide from Alabama flows out on to the New Year's day gridiron determined to engulf the best of the west, the Cardinals of Stanford.
 One year ago tomorrow this same Tide from the south rose to the heights of mythical national football champions, on the same field, by defeating the University of Washington, 20 to 19.
 Stanford, credited in some quarters as the greatest team ever developed on the Pacific coast, remains a slight favorite on the eve of this famous east-west clash, but Alabama, no longer an unknown quantity, has commanded such respect as to bring practically all betting to even money.
 The forecast promises perfect southern California weather, which means that the day will be balmy and Old Sol will send down warmth that, if not entirely acceptable to the gridirers, will make the day from a spectator's standpoint, one of comfort.
