HIGH PEAK LUMBER INDUSTRY REACHED

Moulding company, about three cars of moulding.

All but two of the mills in this section responded to Lee's requests for individual aggregate production figures for the year but the lumberman was unable to arrive at a close estimate of the output of these two concerns, which were the Pelican Bay Lumber company, and the Kwaana Hax company. The estimated cut of the former was placed at 60,000,000, while that for the latter was estimated at 50,000,000 feet. A matter of policy was given as the reason for withholding the exact figures.

Other mills in the county and their total output for 1926, are as follows: Campbell-Towle, 15,000,000 feet; Algoma, 41,000,000; McCollam, 5,500,000; Illinois Lumber company, 3,400,000; Big Lakes, 21,000,000; Wheeler-Olmstead, 25,000,000; Klamath Lumber and Box, 27,000,000; Anna Creek Lumber, 7,000,000; Solomon Butte, 6,000,000; D'Arment, 1,000,000; Forest Lumber, 40,000,000; Braymill White Pine, 18,000,000; Shaw-Bertram, 25,000,000; Lamm Lumber, 31,500,000; Shasta View Lumber, 1,800,000. No figure was available yesterday on the cut of the Lone Pine lumber mill, operated by G. C. Lorenz, due to the latter's absence for the city.

Production figures from mills tributary to this city but located in northern California, are: K. & C. Lumber company, 7,000,000; Har-24,500,000; Knox, 1,500,000; Truman & Maxwell, 2,500,000; and Skiyow Lumber company, 9,000,000 feet.

Promise of a continued high rate of production in 1927 was held in a survey conducted recently by the News, to determine the length of time that various mills here will be closed for winter repairs. Virtually all those mills that will close for a short period, expect to resume operation very early this spring, while many of the big concerns will not close at all for the customary winter repairs.

PRESIDENT MEXICO DISCUSSES ON OIL

try set the welfare of Mexico above all other considerations.

"Those who are able to overcome evil influences, who are capable through generosity or patriotism to free themselves from the burden of their prejudices can still rally around us and accept as legitimate our desire of just betterment of the masses of our country," he declared.

"It is this that we have fought for, and it is this for which we shall always be willing to fight. For we are convinced that the welfare of those large masses of Mexican people is the only reason for bringing on solid ground definite organic peace and prosperity of the Mexican family."

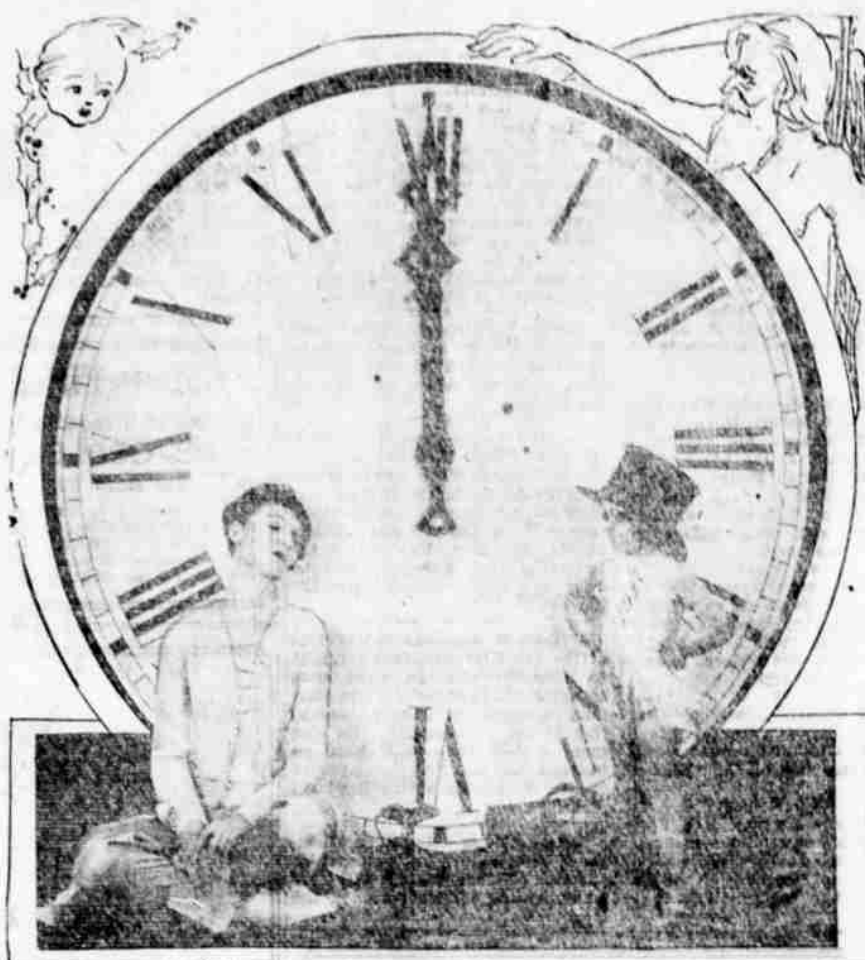
In discussing investments made in Mexico he declared that the government will respect all decisions of the supreme court in settling conflicting interests and that Mexico will continue to welcome moral energy and capital from other countries.

The only condition upon which such foreign activity in Mexico will be welcomed, he said, is that it shall live up to the requirements of "our laws and shall not attempt to absorb our national interests."

In promising that the government has no intention of crushing religious activities he said that it is incorrect to claim that his regime "has tried or wishes to destroy religious faith."
