

Father Ricard's Forecast During January Issued

SANTA CLARA, Cal., Dec. 31, (U.N.)—A rainy January for the Pacific coast is predicted by Father Jerome Ricard, "famous padre of the rains," of the University of Santa Clara.

Father Ricard's forecast for the month, issued today, states that the New Year will be ushered by rain over British Columbia and Washington with increasing cloudiness in California and possibly rain before night in this state. There will be general rains over the coast Sunday, he predicts.

For the remainder of the month Father Ricard gives the following forecasts:

Jan. 2, clearing over north, rain in south.

Jan. 4, generally fair.

Jan. 5, 6, 7, 8, general rains over the coast and interior.

Jan. 9, clearing.

Jan. 10, fair over entire coast.

Jan. 11, 12, rains over coast.

Jan. 13, clearing with scattered sprinkles.

Jan. 14, generally cloudy.

Jan. 15, rain in northern California, northward and eastward.

Jan. 16, clearing.

Jan. 17, new storms entering by north, general rains from Alaska to Point Arguello.

Jan. 18, rains pushing as far south as San Diego.

Jan. 19, rain in all sections except southern California.

Jan. 20, fair from San Luis Obispo to Marshfield, rain Oregon northward and in southern California.

Jan. 21, generally fair.

Jan. 22, beginning another disturbance in the north.

January 23, 24, fair.

January 25, fair central and southern California; rain to northward.

Jan. 26, fair in southern California with rain in north sections.

Jan. 27, rain central California, fair northern Pacific states.

Jan. 28, fair in California, but with new storm advancing from north.

Jan. 29, cloudiness centrally, rain in Oregon and northward.

Jan. 30, some rain from San Francisco to San Diego.

Jan. 31, fair in British Columbia and Alaska coast.

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tween this government and other countries.

The White House spokesman did not reply to sensational critics, but did appeal to the press to uphold the administration. The White House spokesman said in substance:

"As the president has taken occasion to point in a speech at the dedication of the national press club here, the press has a very important responsibility in connection with foreign affairs. It should take an American attitude. The administration is charged with responsibility of protecting American lives and property abroad, and is supported in this by the whole country. But other countries are often misled by articles appearing in American press, encouraging the idea that the country is not united on such a policy.

"We must stand by international law and order, and when that is violated abroad it is the same as when it is violated at home.

"Because some American people criticize the method in which the executive tries to protect American lives and property abroad, the unfortunate impression is created that the country is not united.

"It is important that the press should support the executive in upholding international law."

The White House appeal came at the end of a turbulent week, in which the administration had been criticized by both sides in the Nicaragua controversy. The Washington Post, which had favored strong support of the Diaz faction, today said the administration had receded from its original policy and had adopted one of neutrality between both factions.

ture in building of \$1,682,879 or a slight increase of \$51,032.

The year 1926, as compared with that of 1925, shows a remarkable growth in the four-year period, with permits aggregating but \$379,233.

The past month of December was the poorest in building circles experienced during the past year, according to comparison of other months. There were 38 permits issued, totaling \$18,569. In December, 1925, 49 permits were issued, aggregating \$79,300. December, 1924, shows a total of 20 permits issued, amounting to \$19,216.
