

Romanticist Sees Disillusionment

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 6. (U.N.)—The romanticist, who once thrilled to tales of the languid lovers of old Spain, the fiery amours of France and the off-time tragic love-making of Italy, sits in gloomy disillusionment while American motion pictures spread a new philosophy that all but shatters his ideals.

Moonlit dells, where bashful lovers kissed the fingers of their swains, have been displayed by park-odgling and parlor sofas and Europe is overrun with bleached flappers and cake-eaters who take their lessons from the movies.

The instinctive urge to make love that has been mankind's inherent attribute since the first dawn, changes little. But the technique of lovers has had a startling transition, led by the American youth and Europe is feeling its effect.

To meet with the approval of the once shy, coy maidens of the old country, the European youth must kiss like the rampant movie hero, according to Nils Christander, former director of German films who came to this country to make "Fighting Love," starring Jettie Goudal for the Cecil B. DeMille studios.

"For example," Christander explains, "the German and North European girls were once contented only with little pecks on the forehead and cheeks from their smotherous swains. Now they look for the long fifty-foot passionate kisses they see in American films."

The fervent American brand of saying it with kisses will eventually dissipate the characteristic phlegmatism and stolidity of the foreign maidens for the movies have taught the youngsters of Europe a more pleasing way to make love without any of the inconveniences suffered by their grandparents, Christander believes.

"Europe has not been harmed for the loss of its old brand of love-making, in which the idea was not to show how much you loved a sweetheart but how bravely you could hide your true feelings."

"American youth expresses its sentiments just as human beings are supposed to do, without ostentation or fear. I think this course is much the saner and more pleasing," Christander declared.

Girls, Mentally Are Above Boys

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 6. (U.N.)—The weaker sex has proven itself stronger than the males in babyhood, but even though baby girls are better physically and mentally than baby boys, things even up before they become men and women.

This is the conclusion reached by Dr. A. H. Washburn, who looks over about 16,000 children annually at the juvenile clinic, University of California hospital, and professor S. J. Holmes of the zoology department of the university. They have made extensive studies of the death rate, mental development and physical growth of babies of both sexes.

Statistics show that fewer girl babies die. A study of the death rate of boy and girl infants in the United States showed that of 3,465,464 tabulated between 1900 and 1923, more boys than girls died. The figures disclosed that for every 100 girls succumbing to early death there were 128.5 boys too weak to weather the vicissitudes of life.

Baby girls usually walk and talk at a more tender age than do baby boys.

"Of course they would talk first—doesn't a woman always talk?" remarked Dr. Washburn.

Crime Decreases in Salt Lake City

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 6. (U.N.)—A decrease in crime was reported in Salt Lake City during 1926.

In statistics compiled by Chester Colburn, secretary to Detective Chief Riley M. Beckstead, it was shown that the detective bureau handled 2362 crimes last year as compared with 2591 in 1925.

In 1926 there were 103 less burglaries, 141 less petty larceny cases, 59 less holdups, 21 less safe-crackings and 27 less pickpocket cases.

Three murders were committed in each year.

Bunko men were more active last year than in 1925, however, and 25 persons reported themselves the victims of confidence games as compared with 10 in 1925.

TIMBER IS CRUISED

Timber cruising in the Cascade national forest was mostly in the vicinity of Oakridge the past year, when 14,263 acres of timber were measured by rangers and other officials of the government service. Timber sold during 1926 totalled 3,000,000 board feet, valued at \$4,000, and there was a total of 25,500,000 board feet cut at a valuation of \$33,000. Of these amounts Lane county gets one-fourth.
