

Bud Hodges Held On Liquor Charge

Local police last night made further inroads into the alleged ring of Klamath Falls bootleggers when they arrested Bud Hodges and Aaron Rhodes, caught in the act of delivering a gallon of moonshine to a house on Market street, between Klamath and Broad.

The two men are charged with transportation and possession of liquor and spent last night in the city jail awaiting hearing today. Arresting officers caught the alleged bootleggers just as they were taking the gallon of moonshine from a car which they had driven up in front of the house.

The arrest took place early last night and was followed by the apprehension of Martin Anger, Mexican, who, in a state of extreme intoxication, wandered down past the police station where officers picked him up. Anger had consumed most of the "evidence" but was found with one small drink left in a pint bottle on his hip.

Indications that the excessive use of profanity along Main street must stop, came with the arrest last night of W. E. Williams, local laborer, who is said to have been loud and liberal with his rough language on Main near Tenth, about 3:15 p. m.

Overhearing Williams' invectives hurled at a pair of companions, an officer intruded upon the group and found that Williams was slightly under the influence of liquor and was carrying a bottle. He was placed in jail on a charge of intoxication and creating a disturbance. Williams' companions fled swiftly down the street when the officer took him into custody.

Humble People May Get Wealth

HAVERHILL, Mass., Jan. 6. (U. N.)—A fortune may await two humble families here if relatives in Scotland succeed in establishing claims to an estate of \$5,000,000 which has been in chancery there for almost a century.

Mrs. John Brown contends she is the great granddaughter of the Marquis, while Scott, who is her nephew, bases his claim on that relationship.

The case is pressed by Mrs. Brown's mother, Mrs. Annie Fairholm of Tannochside in Uddingston, Scotland. Mrs. Fairholm is 85, but hopes to see her family established as the legal heirs to the estate before she dies. Attorneys representing her are said to have high hopes of success.

Mrs. Fairholm asserts she is the rightful marchioness of Laurieston, tracing her family back through a maze of ancestors and relatives. She has four daughters and two sons who would also share in the fortune should the court decide the claim was valid.

Two of the daughters now live in America. Mrs. Brown and Mrs. D. Fleming of Reading, Penn. The others live in Scotland.

The heads of the Brown and Scott families here apparently are not getting excited over the prospects of becoming rich. Both said that they would like the money for the sake of their families.

Meantime Brown continues working for the Haverhill Gas Light company while Scott continues to pump tires and drain gas tanks.

Cathcart is Given Police Court Fine

C. F. "Slim" Cathcart, former owner of the Loggers' Cafe on lower Main street, has been released from the city jail after paying a fine of \$25 and costs for his part in the serious injury of Laurence Moore, Western Union messenger boy, who was struck down early on the morning of December 31 by a car driven by Harry Davis and occupied by Cathcart and a quarter-breed Indian girl, Vivian Egan. Cathcart was charged with drunkenness.

Davis is now serving a 90-day sentence from the justice court charged with driving while intoxicated. His sentence was \$350 and costs, 90 days in the county jail and suspension of his driver's license for one year.

The Indian girl has been released. The young boy, still in the Klamath Valley hospital, is suffering from a badly injured back with a possible broken vertebrae.

RAILROAD DISPUTE AGAIN UP TO I. C. C.

for 15 days and through Commissioner Clyde B. Atchison has invited the Oregon public service commission to file within that time "any representation you desire to make."

There is even a hint of a more radical action than the commission has yet taken in the closing lines of Atchison's letter, which says: "We have in mind that your application to reopen docket No. 14392 has not yet been disposed of."

This refers to the case brought by the state commission and heard in the general session, touching upon the need of a cross state line and arrangements in the Klamath basin in harmony therewith.

That case has been held open pending the outcome of other plans set on foot by the commission's order of last May, which granted the Oregon Trunk permission to extend from Bend to Paunina and for negotiations for joint use of the Naton line on to Klamath Falls.

The nub of the failure seems to be the demand of the Oregon Trunk for inclusion of the Strahorn line in the joint ownership plan, which President Sprague of the Southern Pacific characterizes as "decidedly unfair and unacceptable."

The brief of the Northern lines, filed by Carey and Kerr, asserts that they may have "freedom to go where traffic exists" in the Klamath basin, and declares that the effect of the Southern Pacific offer is to limit the use of the Naton line and exclude the Northern lines from territory reached by the Strahorn road, unless they build from Chiloquin to Sprague Landing.

The prayer of the Southern Pacific in closing its report of negotiations is that the commission will ask the Oregon Trunk owners to accept the Southern's offer, and if met with refusal to deny in toto the request of the Northern lines to build southward from Bend.

The counter prayer of the Northern lines is that unless the Southern Pacific agrees to use by them of the Strahorn line from Klamath Falls to Sprague Landing and to share in its northern extension, the commission grant to the Oregon Trunk the right to build and operate over its own tracks from Bend to Klamath Falls in accordance with its original application.

The railroad executives apparently having arrived at opposite terminals the commission sees no need for further threshing of old straw.

Commissioner Atchison briefly observes that further oral argument would likely not be helpful and requests received for extending the controversy in that way are denied. These requests came from Carey and Kerr, and Governor Pierce.

The gravamen of the Oregon Trunk argument is that it cannot accept any limitation in its opportunities to reach the timber, although the Klamath basin includes the Strahorn territory, while the Southern Pacific asserts that it cannot consent to grant away trackage rights it has acquired, or arranged to acquire in that division. It is this head-on collision to which the Oregon commission's attention is now invited.

PORTLAND, Jan. 6. (U. N.)—The offer to the Oregon Trunk for use of Southern Pacific tracks from Paunina to Klamath Falls in connection with central Oregon railroad construction was fair and reasonable, it is contended in a report filed today by the Southern Pacific with the interstate commerce commission.

The report constitutes an answer to a report filed to the same body by the Oregon Trunk line yesterday, in which it said that the restrictions in connection with the Southern Pacific for joint use of tracks for a part of the proposed extension from Bend to Klamath Falls were unreasonable. At the

Oil Bugaboo of Mexico Bobs Up

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 6. (U. N.)—Drastic measures against companies which have not complied with the new Mexican oil laws will be inaugurated immediately, according to the newspaper El Sol.

Minister of Industry Morones is said to dictate the policy of the newspaper.

The original stand of the government which threatened confiscation of foreign properties if they were not registered in accordance with the new laws, will not be altered, says El Sol.

Morones today sent a list of all companies not complying with the laws to Attorney General Ortigas so that he might begin action against them. The list is headed by the Gulf Oil company, the Huasteca, Aguilera and Corona companies.

Bank Will Loan on Vet Insurance

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 5. (U. N.)—The Bankers' Trust company this morning reversed their former position on the bonus insurance loans and opened three windows to veterans and loans were made on presentation of the policy with identification.

The three windows were opened in a special building decorated with flags and bearing a sign inviting veterans to present their policies. Other banks here continue to restrict loans to customers only.

Motion Picture to Take Part in Wars

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 6. (U. N.)—The tide of defeat or victory in the next war may be turned through the aid of the motion picture.

At least, the handwriting is on the wall, for the United States army has just taken a leaf from the film book and has decided to try motion picture methods in conducting forthcoming maneuvers, with the definite probability that their use may be adopted in actual battle, if the need ever arises.

The idea was evolved at San Antonio, Texas, where the Paramount company is making "Wings," a film portraying the work of the United States air service in the world war.

A battle area covering five square miles, Lucien Hubbard, who is supervising the picture and William Wellman, director, resorted to radio broadcasting from a captive observation balloon, high above the battle area.

Army officers who witnessed the photographing of the scenes and the perfect coordination of action which resulted from the radio direction were deeply impressed by the possibilities it offered. The same system is to be employed when the eighth corps area, with headquarters at San Antonio, assemble at Camp Stanley in January for a war game in which infantry and field artillery and airplanes will engage.

The orders, through the pseudo battle, are to be issued by radio from a reconnaissance plane. Along the battle front there will be eight miniature broadcasting stations tuned in with the directing plane. These stations will receive and broadcast the orders which will control every movement of the troops and the planes and the artillery fire.

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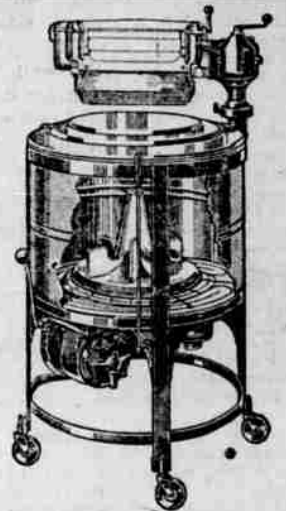
