

School Girl Found Nearly Exhausted

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 7. (U. N.)—Hysterical and nearly exhausted after three days in the open without food, a 19-year-old school girl, who ran away from her classroom to seek more exciting adventures, has been found in the barren hills near Grantsville.

Marie Cameron, who says that her father is Thomas Cameron, a city employee of Tucson, Arizona, was placed in the county jail here tonight at request of livery proprietors, who charge that the girl rented two horses without returning them.

Miss Cameron disappeared Tuesday, but search for her was not started until the livery men complained. When found wandering aimlessly about the Grantsville desert country she acted like a wild creature, her discoverers reported. They told of how the girl had screamed at them and resisted furiously when they sought to persuade her to return.

Upon arrival here Miss Cameron's strength had been restored somewhat. She said that she had run away from a girls' school in California and come here seeking work. Unable to find employment, she said, she had rented the horses with the idea of returning to Tucson.

Is Tired of Jail; Gives Up Daughter

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 7. (U. N.)—After spending 16 months in jail, A. H. Hall has announced that he is willing to reveal the whereabouts of his eight-year-old daughter, who was placed in the custody of Mrs. Hall, following a decree of divorce, but who was kidnapped by Hall in a successful attempt to keep her from the mother.

Hall was placed in jail for contempt of court and said he would "rot" there before turning the daughter over to her mother. He now asks a rehearing of the divorce case.

LONDON-NEW YORK TALK SHOP OVER SEA

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600,000 were completed in a few minutes.

Although the American Telephone and Telegraph company had announced that it would be impossible for any one to tune in on conversations going both ways across the ocean, there were numerous reports that this had been accomplished.

Late in the afternoon the reception faded, necessitating numerous suspensions, but was resumed at 6:30 p. m., London time.

LOEB JURY DISAGREES

JOLIET, Ill., Jan. 7. (U. N.)—The jury in Charles Roam's \$100,000 damage suit against Nathan Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb, was dismissed today after deliberating 25 hours. From the first to the last the jurors stood deadlocked at 8 to 4 for conviction. Thirty ballots were taken. On the 27th Judge Frank L. Hooper asked the foreman if an agreement were possible and was answered negatively.

CONCESSION ANNULLED

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 7. (U. N.)—A concession granted in 1924 to the Colorado River Land company, which was organized by American capital, has been annulled by the department of agriculture, according to the newspaper El Sol.

Quitting of the foreigners from Hankow constitutes the first complete anti-foreign victory of the Cantonese.

PEKING, Jan. 8. (Saturday)—British gunboats now stationed at Hankow will not be permitted to leave there pending settlement of the ultimatum delivered by nationalists Thursday, a representative of the south Chinese government has told British consular agent.

If the boats make an attempt to draw anchor the nationalists will not be responsible for any "accident" to them, the representative said. British residents of Chengtu, in Szechuan province and at Ichang are preparing to leave those places immediately.

In addition to the loss of prestige by British evacuation of Hankow, property valued at a minimum of \$50,000,000 has been left in charge of the Cantonese. Almost all those who left lost all their personal belongings.

DANCE OF DEATH

LONDON, Jan. 7. (U. N.)—"A dance of death at sea has been begun by the powers," says the Star, liberal English newspaper, in commenting on the proposed cruiser building program of the United States.

Announcement of such a program in the United States will be followed by one that Great Britain will meet, and later by a similar statement from Tokyo, the Star believes.

Tod Morgan Loses To Phil McGraw

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Jan. 7. (U. N.)—Phil McGraw of Detroit was declared a winner over Tod Morgan, the junior lightweight champion from Seattle, after ten rounds of fighting in Madison Square Garden Friday night.

The title was not at stake as they fought at catchweights, Morgan coming in at 131½ to 134½ for his opponent.

The champion was ahead in practically every round and the decision of the judges was simply impossible to comprehend. The crowd of 10,000, which had been rooting for McGraw, because the Greek was trying hard and forcing the fighting against a vastly superior boxer, booed Phil and remained to cheer for the downcast champion.
