company of the railroad properties of the Oregon and California railroad, which, over and above the refunding of said bonds, will amount to \$35,879,987.77.

(c)—To provide funds for the purchase of the properties of the Marion and Linn county railroad company for the sum of \$34,332.27; (d)—To reimburse the treasury of the Southern Pacific company in the amounts heretofore expended in the purchase of seven small railroads in Oregon some years ago together with the amounts expended in making improvements on such properties.

(e)—To provide moneys for further needs of Southern Pacific company's lines in Oregon. The statement continued: "The properties of the Oregon and California railroad company consist of the present main line operated by the Southern Pacific company between Portland and the California-Oregon state line together with a number of branches mainly in the Willamette Valley, of a total mileage of 682.82."

"The properties of the Marion and Linn county railroad consist of a line of railroad 2.24 miles in length in Marion county, Oregon, extending from Hoover to Idanha. "The effect of the transaction will be to place the Southern Pacific company in the direct ownership of its principal lines in Oregon, formerly held by it directly through its ownership of the capital stock of the companies named which will be eliminated. The plan is intended to provide funds to retire the outstanding Oregon and California bonds, with adequate provision for additional bonds upon which to obtain moneys for future development in Oregon and will also eliminate intermediate corporations now wholly unnecessary and simplify corporate and financial relationships. "The proposals will not affect the operating of the lines in Oregon."

KLAMATH MAY GET AIR MAIL BASE

hour or 16 forward it according to the request, reclamation officials advised that meteorological equipment be furnished the Southern Pacific freight depot where the night trick telegraph operator could view weather conditions at the specific time.

Due to a lack of funds the Portland weather bureau was unable to install new equipment for another weather station here and so the barometers and thermometers which for the past 29 years have furnished this data at the reclamation office, were installed at the freight depot. Seth V. Key, night operator for the Southern Pacific, will be Klamath Falls' official weather doctor from now on, succeeding H. K. Smith of the reclamation service, as a result of the shift. For the benefit of air mail operators, he will from now on send to Portland and Concord, information and temperatures, clouds and fog, if any, and wind directions.

Local opinion is that even if the move does not indicate an immediate installation of an air mail base here, it is plainly evident that Pacific Air Transport officials are planning to keep data on local weather conditions which will establish for them the fact that flying conditions here are superior to those of the Willamette valley. The reclamation service will continue to keep its own meteorological data, however, with other special equipment, it was stated yesterday. As the Southern Pacific station here is required to keep weather statistics for official use, taking over the weather bureau work will inconvenience the company only to the extent of keeping a few extra records.

Cascade Route is Help to Medford

If the opening of the Cascade route of the Southern Pacific, which goes to San Francisco by way of Klamath Falls instead of Ashland and Medford accomplished nothing else, it helped Medford police a lot, in the opinion of Chief Charles Adams.

"Last year we had a series of holdups and other robberies," Adams said. "This year there has been but one robbery, a big safe-blowing job, that could be blamed on transients. Last year our jail was full of suspects all the time, while this winter we have many less."

Adams explained that many huns were following the new route south, thus greatly cutting down the number of transient criminals who had to be watched, and who staged many robberies.—Medford News.

Hoboes Beat Cop Giving Greeting

That the word of an active police department travels swiftly and to remote sections of the country, was evidenced last night when a pair of so-called railroad hoboes beat a local policeman to the greeting by announcing that they were headed "straight on through" Klamath Falls. The incident took place on Main street, where Captain Burke noted a couple of new faces and started to ask the ways and whereabouts of their visitation here. One of the duo, before the policeman had an opportunity to accost them, said: "It's alright, captain, we're headed right on through and will be out of here at the first opportunity tomorrow morning. We've heard of this town up north, from hoboes who have had to leave, and didn't stop off with intentions of staying long."

Oil Companies Are Barred in Missouri

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Jan. 12. (U.N.)—Twenty nine Texas oil companies Wednesday were ordered by T. S. Stockard to cease further selling of oil stock in Missouri. According to Stockard many wildcat companies have been flooding the mails with their stock selling propositions and get rich quick schemes. The oil companies barred from stock selling have not been licensed in Texas or Missouri to sell securities. "There are many oil firms in Texas that are advertising various schemes for getting rich in the oil business and nearly all do their business by mail. They do not bother people living in the oil communities because they know that no attention is paid to their schemes there," he said.
