Pal of Brownlee Told False Story

PORTLAND, Jan. 13. (U.N.)—False statements attributed to Al Feyerabend, pal of Leslie Brownlee, who lost his life on Mount Hood, today caused mountaineers to hope that they would recover the body of the youth who was lost on New Year's day.

Authorities here questioned Feyerabend upon demand of the father of the missing boy, Joseph Brownlee, and Feyerabend admitted that the story of the climb to the top of the peak and of being separated in a raging blizzard was not true.

Instead of climbing the mountain Feyerabend admitted that he went but a short distance and then returned. Upon arriving back in camp, he said, he had made the climb and after Brownlee failed to appear he was unwilling to tell the truth.

That the untruths handicapped the search and may have cost Brownlee his life is the opinion of William Leutz and Mark Weygandt, well known mountaineers, for the search was conducted on a basis of the Brownlee youth being lost near the timberline.

The mountaineers are convinced now after hearing Feyerabend's story that Brownlee wandered off south of Crater Rock and that his body probably will be found in this district.

Brownlee had made a will before starting, and had left a small sum of money to Feyerabend and that was the cause of the investigation. There is no formal complaint against Feyerabend.

Moroni Players to Again Visit Here

GREAT MERGER OF RAILWAYS PLANNED

NEW YORK, Jan. 13. (U.N.)—Merger of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific railways, which would create the largest railroad system in North America, in point of mileage, is definitely under way.

Announcement was made Thursday that a meeting would be held here next week to begin work on a petition to the interstate commerce commission for authority to complete the proposed merger, first made public in 1924.

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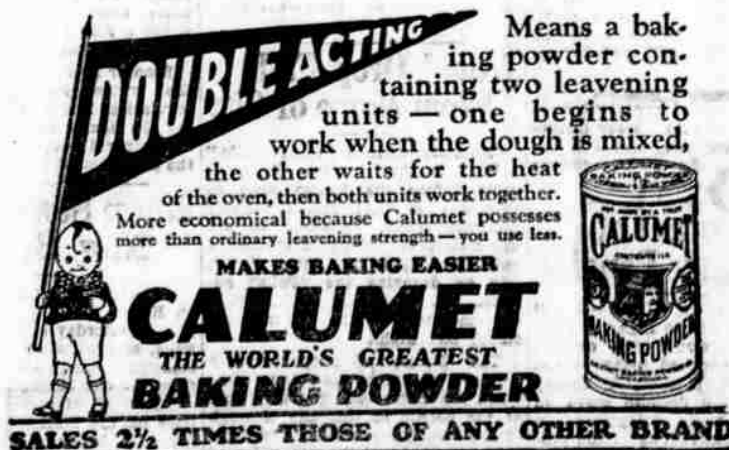
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
