

## Coast League May Become an Outlaw

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18. (U. N.)—The Pacific Coast league may pull away from organized baseball and turn outlaw as a result of the new draft agreement entered into at French Lick, Ind., by representatives of major and minor leagues, according to George Alfred Putnam, part owner and secretary of the San Francisco club of the coast circuit.

Putnam referred to the placing of players of the Pacific coast, International and Three Eye leagues and the American association under the universal draft.

"The sale of players has permitted us either to break even or show a profit at the close of each season for the last 10 years," Putnam said. "Without sale of young stars which the universal draft would curtail we cannot possibly operate at a profit. If the Pacific Coast league does not turn outlaw it will be necessary to cut down expenses to such an extent that Portland and Seattle will have to be dropped and the Pacific Coast league changed into a California state league. We cannot make money and meet the high cost of transportation without protection for our young stars."

The draft price was raised from \$5,000 to \$7,500, but coast clubs have been in the habit of getting much more than that for their stars. Paul Waner and Hal Rhyne were sold by the Seals for \$100,000. Willie Kamm was sold to the White Sox for \$125,000. The Reds paid \$65,000 for Jimmy Caveney and Jimmy O'Connell, now banned from organized baseball cost the Giants \$75,000. The Yankees paid \$75,000 for Tom Laberri, former Salt Lake City slugger.

## Major and Minor Leagues Sign Up

FRENCH LICK, Ind., Jan. 18. (U. N.)—Forgetting for the moment impending hostilities between Judge K. M. Landis, and President Ban Johnson of the American league, representatives of major and minor league baseball clubs today drew up a long term agreement, extending until November 12, 1934, covering the exchange of ball players.

The agreement automatically will remain in effect after that time until either major or minor league representatives give notice of a desire to terminate it. The draft price for players from AA clubs was set at \$7,500, although minor league representatives have sought to secure a price of \$10,000. For other clubs the price was set as follows: Class A, \$5,500; B, \$3,500; C, \$2,000; D, \$1,500.

The number of players the major leagues may hold optionally while giving them experience in the minor leagues was increased from eight to twelve, this being a compromise for the major leagues had sought to increase the number of optional players to 15.

Players of the American association, the International league, the Pacific Coast league and the Three Eye league, who are not now subject to the universal draft agreement will come under the universal draft after October, 1928.

## Landis-Johnson Fued is Renewed

CHICAGO, Jan. 18. (U. N.)—A calm, powerful David will meet a fiery Goliath in mortal combat Monday, and in the opinion of the spectators, the battle will end in the ignominious death of the overtowering giant—in a baseball sense.

As Judge Kenesaw M. Landis pokes himself for the fight with bulky Byron Bancroft Johnson, followers of the national pretense predict victory for the high commissioner of baseball.

Johnson has openly charged that Landis sought publicity when he exposed the Cobb-Specker case to the public and says he will repeat this accusation at the open meeting Monday.

Johnson also has admitted there are facts in the historic case which have not been made public. He has admitted that detectives have been watching ball players.

The Johnson-Landis feud is not new born, having developed two years ago when Johnson criticized the commissioner in connection with the O'Connell-Dolan scandal. American clubowners, with the possible exception of Phil Hall of St. Louis, signed a statement of assurance to the commissioner in December, 1924, to the effect that Johnson's misconduct will cease or his immediate removal from the office will follow.

The fireworks may sparkle on Sunday, at which time American league magnates will meet Johnson, the meeting, called by the junior circuit president, supposedly will consider the plan of action to be followed at Monday's open session with Landis. Baseball men point out that there is nothing to prevent the magnates from speaking their mind Sunday.

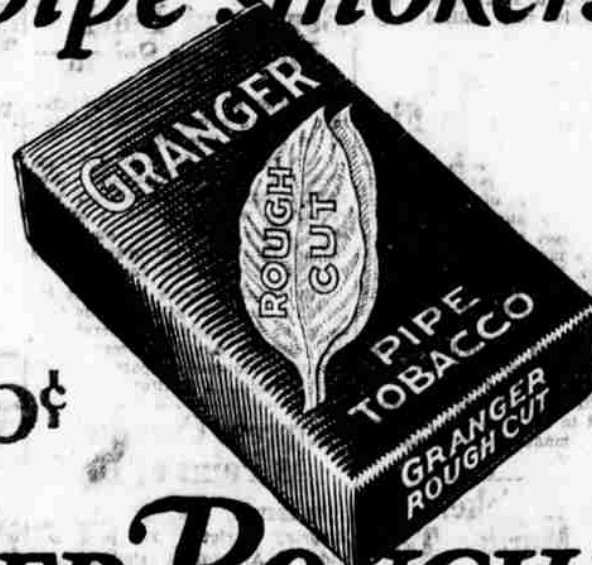
