

Tourist Travel is Assured Increase

Prospects are good for a new high peak of tourist travel to the Pacific Northwest, and especially to Oregon during the coming summer, according to J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific company, who recently passed through here en route from a traffic meeting in San Francisco, to his Portland headquarters.

Company agents from eastern cities attending the big traffic conference, reported that indications point toward heavier tourist travel for the year. Ormandy stated, and in California it is said that many of the native residents are planning to spend their vacations in Oregon playgrounds.

"There are two reasons for expecting Californians to head this way this summer," said the passenger agent. "They have enjoyed good prosperity down there, which makes travel possible, and the recreational features of Oregon are becoming increasingly better known."

In Ormandy's opinion, everyone, including Californians, who visit any playground in this state, from Klamath county northward, returns home with the good word that in this state are to be found outlying facilities galore. He pointed out that the cumulative effect of this booster advertising in the past will be felt not only in this year's travel, but in the years to come.

Ormandy believes the lakes and streams of the southern Oregon basin will prove more popular than ever before with outsiders this summer, due no little to the opening of the scenic Cascade line of the Southern Pacific, which has opened in turn a vast mountainous area where camping and fishing possibilities are unlimited.

offer an alleged low bid based on the appraised valuation of \$12,500. The thunderbolt fell, however, promptly at two o'clock when Herbert D. Newell, project superintendent, offered the site for sale and called for auction bids. Paul Reiss, Hyllesby corporation attorney from Chicago and representative at the meeting for the California Oregon Power company, declared his firm would offer no bids unless other interests bid on the site.

Attitude of the power company toward purchase of the tract yesterday, was expressed in a written statement which Reiss presented to the project superintendent, and which follows:

"Inasmuch as The California Oregon Power company does not at this time have any particular use for the McCormick site and indeed may never have any occasion to use it, and since the site itself seems to have little potential value as a power site, the company is not vitally interested in making a bid for the property at this time.

"However, if the sale is to proceed and other bids are received, the company as a matter of course will exercise its legal right to bid on the property."

No other bids were forthcoming, so the delegation of water users and district directors who had gathered at the reclamation office to listen in on the expected bidding, dispersed.

As directors of the district held the opinion previously that the power company had requested the government to put the site up for sale at this time, they are now inclined to think that the vigorous protest on the part of the district has not been altogether in vain and that the power company now wishes to await developments on the Klamath Suit bill before acquiring the sole remaining power site on the project.

Refusal of Copco to bid on the site, leaves the matter somewhat up in the air locally. Interviewed on the unexpected situation which has arisen, Superintendent Newell was yesterday unable to state what action the government will now take toward holding or disposing of the site.

Agriculture Will Be Great Factor

With Klamath county facing a year forecasted to be one of the most prosperous agriculturally in the history of the section, there has become apparent on the local realty mart an increased demand for farm property.

Keenest reflection of the demand for larger farms during the past week, was noted in the office of Watters & Barnhisel, where two transactions for Klamath farms were closed, with others pending.

One of the deals consummated was the sale of an 80-acre farm adjoining the J. Dixon ranch in the Henley district, to Perry Wilson, former part owner of the Mecca billiard hall of this city. Anxious to take advantage of the present good weather that has brought about general farming activity in the county, Wilson has already taken possession of his new place, it was stated. The farm was formerly owned by J. K. Elliott.

T. J. Buchanan, chief engineer for the Pelican Bay Lumber company, was the purchaser of the second farm sold during the week by Watters & Barnhisel. This sale constituted a part of the old M. S. West farm in the Henley district, and comprised some 25 acres, according to Mayor Tom B. Watters, senior member of the local realty firm.
