

Bootleg Forces Face Big Hazard In Lake County

Indications of the difficulties confronting the bootleg industry in the past three months is disclosed in examining the records of the justice court, where it is found that a total of \$1,027.50 has been assessed in twenty cases that have appeared, says the Examiner. The tripartite of officials behind the scenes consists of Sheriff E. A. Friday, District Attorney Chas. Combs and Justice H. J. Angstead.

Once in the toils of the law, it's jail or cash. Of the twenty arrests only two have laid out their portion. George Moore and Ed Papell, who were arrested before they had been able to market their first batch of liquor, and consequently were without funds. In addition to these cases coming before the office, the district attorney handled eighteen cases, involving larceny, forgery and other crimes, some of which netted additional funds to the credit of the treasury. The Gonzales case is the single murder case in the county during the year, and resulted in a victory for the state forces, the sheriff and district attorney figuring prominently in the victory.

Rabbit Pelts of Idaho in Demand

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 19, (U.N.)—Trappers are earning good wages in Power county, catching jackrabbits and shipping their skins to dealers in New York city, says a dispatch from American Falls, Idaho, to the Tribune. According to County Agent L. E. Tilton nine crews are now at work in various parts of the county, and more will be starting in a few days.

Early last month the county agent received a communication from an eastern firm saying they were interested in buying rabbit skins. Their attention had been attracted by drives earlier in the fall, and they indicated that they were eager to get in touch with persons willing to trap for the market. When Tilton announced that there was a demand for Idaho rabbit skins he received a considerable number of responses from farmers and others interested.

Quotations were obtained by Tilton, the New York firm offering to pay 50 cents a pound for gray rabbit skins, 18 cents per skin for white jacks and 45 cents per skin for snowshoes. These figures seemed to offer fair remuneration for their work, and a number of them began operations two weeks ago.

Coyotes Kill Deer In Scott Valley

Word comes from the mountain regions, Scott valley and outlying districts, that coyotes are killing the white tail deer and have been devouring the animals all winter. Hunters of quail have reported finding the carcasses of deer partly eaten by coyotes. The Parker ranch, known as the "deer ranch," report finding where ever so many deer have been slain and eaten by coyotes. Stockmen who ride the range also report where the coyotes have slain many.

The coyotes get a deer cut out and away from others and then chase and worry the animal till it is unable to put up a fight, when the coyotes attack and kill the helpless deer.

Botulinus Germs Found in Oregon

PORTLAND, Jan. 19, (U.N.)—A soil survey recently conducted through the La Grande chamber of commerce reveals that six of eighteen tests taken over Union county showed evidence of botulinus germs, according to Dr. William Levin, director of the laboratory of the state board of health, says a dispatch from La Grande to the Oregonian.

These facts were brought out at a combined meeting of the health and agriculture committees of the chamber of Hot Lake, with Dr. W. T. Phyl, president of the state board of health and the chamber of commerce, presiding.

The samples, coming from various parts of the county, indicate that the germs, which in canned goods produce a toxin which is poisonous, may appear at any point in eastern Oregon. It is announced that the poison may be killed if the home-canned vegetable is boiled for 20 minutes before serving.

Johnson-Landis in Serious Row

NEW YORK, Jan. 19, (U.N.)—If Judge Landis succeeds in ousting Ban Johnson from the presidency of the American league Monday, his successor for the \$40,000-a-year job is likely to be Edward G. Barrow, general manager of the New York Yankees.

Barrow is said to have the backing of the New York delegation of club leaders, who will attend the Landis meeting. He became general manager of the Yankees in 1920. Before that he served as manager of the Boston Red Sox and president of the International league.

Barrow claims to have been in baseball 31 years without ever making a bet on a game.

Dundee Will Try To Tame Wildcat

NEW YORK, Jan. 19, (U.N.)—Joe Dundee, Baltimore welterweight, who took the thunder out of the Tacoma tornado, Eddie Roberts, next will appear in an act known as "taming the Nebraska wildcat."

Dundee, who reversed on Eddie Roberts last week, has been signed to meet "Ace" Hudkins in a 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden, Feb. 25.

The "Nebraska wild cat," who knocked out Ruby Goldstein and also whipped Phil McGraw as a lightweight, has grown into the 147-pound class, and his bout with Dundee will be his first serious bid for welterweight honors.

Sam Langford is Given Big Benefit

NEW YORK, Jan. 15, (U.N.)—Sam Langford, once known as the Boston Tar Baby, and rated among the greatest heavyweights, black or white, of all time, is some \$5,000 richer as a result of a benefit show Wednesday night at the Walker A. C., coupled with contributions from leading figures of the boxing world.

Sam, who drifted down from his native Nova Scotia, to start boxing around Boston as a boy a quarter of a century ago, is only 41 years old, but practically blind and unable to support himself without financial assistance.

Fans Are Seeking Ban's Successor

NEW YORK, Jan. 19, (U.N.)—Up and down the highways of ash and horsehide, the length and breadth of baseball, the fans are engaged in naming a successor to Ban B. Johnson, as president of the American league.

"The king is as good as dead," they cry, not doubting that Judge Landis will oust his erstwhile enemy in view of the present provocation. "Long live the king."

As to Johnson's successor, however, opinion as is divided as it is unanimous on the subject of his removal.

A dozen prominent baseball men have their hats ready to toss into the ring in quest of that \$40,000 a year job, which they believe soon will be vacant.

Although Ban Johnson apparently has been afflicted with hoof and mouth disease for time—in that every time he opened his mouth he put his foot in it—no logical successor ever has been groomed for his job.

So let Landis deliver the coup de grace at Chicago Monday and watch the skimmers of candidates fly into the ring like the bonuses of college students over the goalposts after a football victory.

There will be the purplest fedora of big Ed Barrow, business manager of the Yankees; the iron hat of Colonel Jacob Ruppert, the big half of one per cent man; the tan stetson of E. S. Barnard, proxy of the Indians; the brown derby of Frank Navin, of Detroit, to say nothing of the assorted headgear of such candidates as John Conway Toole, president of the International league; Tom Hickey, of the American Association, and the sombrero of Harry Williams, head of the Coast league.

The constitution of the American league provides that the vice president, who happens to be Navin, shall succeed temporarily in case the president is ill, absent, or happens to collide with K. M. Landis. The last named exigency is considered fatal. It is not believed, however, that Navin would be retained permanently at the head of the junction major circuit.

For one thing, the president of the Tigers is too closely connected in the Cobb-Speaker scandal.

Judge William G. Brandam, a North Carolina lawyer who has been president of the South Atlantic, Piedmont and Virginia leagues successively, is being boosted as Ban's best successor.

Jake Ruppert is probably the most influential of the American league magnates. It is doubtful if he wants the job of president, except as a last resort to keep the peace, and then only for a limited period.
