

Eighteen Unions In Labor Council

Membership in the Klamath Falls Central Labor Union will reach a total of 18 local unions with the installation Thursday evening, January 27, of the Teamsters and Chauffeurs organization.

This is according to C. D. Long, business agent for the Carpenters' union of this city, who yesterday announced that the Teamsters and Chauffeurs organization is now being formed and will be ready for entrance into the Central union next week.

Latest addition to the central union was the Klamath Falls Musicians local which is now applying for a charter as the local body of the American Federation of Musicians, Long stated.

Both the Central Labor Union and the Building Trades council here have just completed a year of extremely good progress and with 1927 prospects for additional union strength, all those identified with the local labor movement are highly optimistic over the future.

Scout Training Leaders Named

R. Blevins, Klamath County Scout executive, yesterday announced the appointment of a committee which will take charge of the boy scout leadership course to start here February 15 and extend through March 8.

The course will be open to all who are interested in training themselves for boys' work and especially in scouting. Blevins stated, and as 52 men signed up for a similar course last year, it is expected that the enrollment will be considerably larger this season.

On the committee, headed by Geo. J. Walton, are the following: C. T. Roberts, H. A. Hamaker, Mayor Tom B. Watters, Dr. George I. Wright, Dr. Paul Sharp, Lloyd Porter, George R. Lindley, and several others.

The course will consist of eight sessions in charge of Blevins, six in the morning and the last two out of doors for the finishing touches of the scout work. Those taking the course will meet twice weekly for two hour sessions.

Brooding over an unhappy love affair with a Medford woman, whose name could not be learned, Martin at 5 o'clock Monday night drank a large quantity of Roach's Ant Paste, an insect exterminator containing arsenic, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Moore, 401 South Newtown, where he stayed.

Discovering the tragedy, Moore summoned Dr. A. F. Kresse. Dr. Charles T. Sweeney was also called. Martin was removed to the hospital where he died next morning.

Balsiger Conducts Fordson Clinic

Nearly 200 men interested in the mechanism of Fordson tractors, either as owners or prospective owners, gathered at Balsiger's garage here Wednesday morning to watch two Portland tractor experts disassemble two of the machines and put them together again.
