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JUDICIAL

One joy of running a paper is getting all shades of opinion and belief, making enemies for a day and friends for a week, and feeling in our bones that to some extent we are helping the community.

Somebody came in the other day with a reported sale of ranch property that loomed big. We didn't print it. We didn't think then and we don't think now that large operations are easily consummated. We allow for possible slips and probable differences, and instead of lending the news columns for mere promotion we carefully await the facts. And some few readers have been frank enough to say that they appreciate the News' policy in censoring and modifying, instead of spreading eagle and magnifying.

Little things like these are what really make a paper. Being absolutely independent, and nobody's organ, we are able to be genuine and sincere in both news and comment, and to consider wholeheartedly the best interests of Klamath county. We know of no journal anywhere, for a town of this size, that measures up to the one you are reading now, and the best assurance we have of your satisfaction is the steady climb, climb, climb of circulation and revenue.

INTEGRITY

Going far afield, the manner in which Great Britain is paying her war debt is strikingly impressive, notwithstanding the millions and millions due her from other nations which she cannot collect. And applying that locally we are under obligation to redeem certain city and county warrants, long in default, which constitute a serious chalkmark against our credit.

It seems that Klamath, like lots of people, has had difficulty at times in making two ends meet. When things go wrong we don't exactly stop living, but usually carry on as best we can, usually at the expense of the local grocer. Most of us gladly remember this when good fortune comes, and see that the grocer gets his money. In the case of the community, those who cashed the city warrants have had a long tiresome wait, with very little encouragement, and it is proposed now to make a clean sweep of the whole indebtedness and wipe it off the books.

This explains the bond election of Feb. 1st, the precise reason for it, and the imperative need that Klamath maintain its credit at a hundred per cent. Anything that looks like judgment or default is tantamount to a black eye, and will hurt us in promoting

the various enterprises. First and foremost, we must keep our reputation good. What nations are doing in a big way we must do as a matter of absolute integrity.

We may as well know in advance that the Klamath of 1927 is going to be obstreperous. We started out by cleaning house, and we'll vault into Spring with a new determination to really do things. The old system of gagging and blindfolding is taboo. There are mighty few of us left who are willingly tied to anyone's apron strings.

The influx of many new people will change the complexion of things. Old-timers may not exactly like it, any more than a child relishes the castor-oil the doctor prescribes. Conditions have been sugar-coated long enough. We need the jars and jolts to shake loose and shake down everything of prejudice, everything of intolerance and particularly everything that resembles dictation and control. And whether we like them or not, the developments of the next few months will be a wholesome lesson in community welfare.

RESOLUTION

FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR THE HEARING OF OBJECTIONS TO THE PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL MADE AND FILED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL IN THE MATTER OF THE IMPROVEMENT OF ALAMEDA STREET FROM THE NORTHERLY LINE OF MELROSE STREET TO THE EASTERLY BOUNDARY LINE OF THE CITY, PACIFIC TERRACE FROM THE SOUTHERLY LINE OF HURON STREET TO ITS INTERSECTION WITH ALAMEDA AVENUE, OR STREET; MELROSE STREET FROM THE WESTERLY LINE OF ELDORADO AVENUE TO ITS INTERSECTION WITH ALAMEDA STREET; AUBURN FROM THE WESTERLY LINE OF PACIFIC TERRACE TO ITS INTERSECTION WITH ALAMEDA STREET; AND ERIE STREET FROM THE WESTERLY LINE OF PACIFIC TERRACE TO ITS INTERSECTION WITH ALAMEDA STREET; THE SAME BEING KNOWN AS IMPROVEMENT UNIT No. 53, AND APPROVING THE ASSESSMENT ROLL HERETOFORE FILED HEREIN.

WHEREAS, the Common Council has made and filed in the office of Police Judge the PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL in connection with the proposed improvement of Alameda street, from the northerly line of Melrose street to the easterly line of the city; Pacific Terrace, from the southerly line of Huron street to its intersection with Alameda avenue or street; Melrose street, from the westerly line of Eldorado avenue to its intersection with Alameda street; Earle street, from the westerly line of Eldorado avenue to its intersection with Alameda street; Eldorado avenue, from the southerly line of Huron street to its intersection with Alameda street; the same being known as Improvement Unit No. 53, as more fully appears on the plans and described in the specifications of the city engineer on file with the Police Judge of Klamath Falls,

CITY BRIEFS

At Modoc Point—Fred Peterson, county school superintendent, visited at Modoc Point yesterday in the interests of the schools.

Resign Positions—Mrs. Jacques J. Steiger Jr. and Mrs. Willard Smith resigned their positions on Monday morning of the past week in the chamber of commerce. Just who would be obtained to fill the vacancies left by Mrs. Steiger and Mrs. Smith, is not known.

Reorganize Classes—The upper grades of the city schools, will probably submit to radical changes this coming week as the incoming students will crowd already overflowing class rooms. The upper grades will be divided into "A" and "B" according to heads of schools in the city. A large number of first grade and primary students are expected to enroll in the city schools next week on January 24.

Oregon, in the matter of said improvement Unit No. 53, **RESOLVED**, BE IT RESOLVED by the Common Council that Monday, the 24th day of January, 1927, at the hour of 8 o'clock P.M., at the Council Chambers in the said city, the said date being the regular meeting date of the said Council, be and is hereby fixed as the date, time and place for the hearing of objections to such PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL and to the individual property assessments therein set forth.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL is hereby approved by the Common Council.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Police Judge of said city of Klamath Falls give at least ten (10) days' notice by publication in the Klamath News on three (3) separate days and by posting notices on each lot, part of lot, block, piece or parcel and acreage property set forth and described in said proposed assessment roll, that at said meeting of the Common Council on said date all objections made and filed to such assessment roll and to the individual assessments therein will be heard and determined; and that following a determination of all objections the Common Council will proceed by Ordinance to assess the proportionate share of the cost of making such proposed improvement in accordance with the benefit accruing therefrom to each lot, part of lot, block, piece or parcel of land or acreage property heretofore found and determined to be liable for such cost; such notice to be posted and published as aforesaid shall further state the boundaries within which the property lies that is found to be benefited and liable for such proportionate share of the cost of such improvement and shall refer to such PROPOSED ASSESSMENT ROLL for detailed information and for boundaries within which the property lies that is so benefited and to be assessed for such improvement.

It is all the property lying adjacent to the said streets as far as the improvement extends thereon and extending back from the side lines of the said streets to the center of the respective blocks so lying adjacent, together with the quarter of each block abutting upon and adjacent to a street intersection which said quarter shall be liable for such intersection.

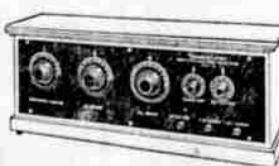
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Keno Visitor—H. L. Cleveland of Keno spent a short time in Klamath Falls Thursday afternoon from his home in the neighboring community.
