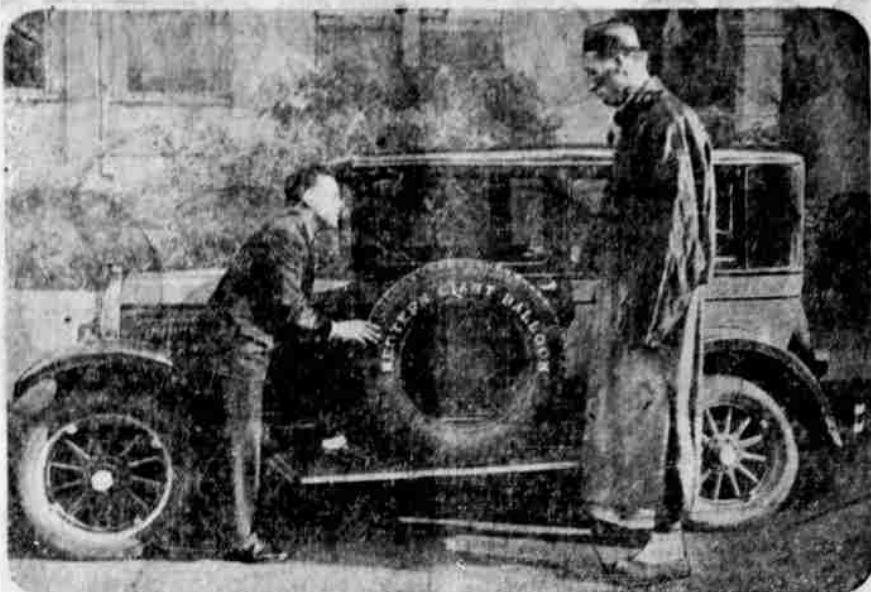

CAPITAL PEDESTRIANS FEAR
SPEEDING "DIPLOMATIC CARS"

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—A young man was carried into a Washington hospital the other night, the victim of an automobile accident.

Who he was the surgeon who operated on him had no idea.

It was not until later that he discovered that his patient was his son, so horribly mutilated that his own father had failed to recognize him.

He died without regaining consciousness.

"Ah, 'diplomatic car' again," commented Washington, on reading of the wreck in the next morning's newspapers.

The fact that it was a "diplomatic car" explained everything. It was painful, but nothing to be surprised about.

"Diplomatic cars" are the terror of the capital.

Diplomats and all members of their personal and official families are immune from arrest.

It isn't a matter of law, but of international usage. Probably a diplomat who committed burglary or murder would find himself in trouble, but for little peccadilloes like

violation of the dry law or traffic regulations nobody thinks of holding him accountable.

Anybody would think a well-brought-up diplomat would be extra careful not to abuse privileges. Such may be the case with some, but certainly not with all of them. Especially is "diplomatic auto" speeding the curse of Washington.

When it is considered that there are more than fifty embassies and legations here, each with a staff of ten or a dozen, or around 500 motorists who are entitled to run as wild as they please, and who mostly do please to run hog wild, it is easy to realize why the prudent Washingtonian hunts his hole when he sees a car coming with the throttle wide open and an individual who looks as if he might be a diplomat or a near diplomat at the steering wheel.

A list of narrow escapes from "diplomatic cars" would fill a volume the size of an unabridged dictionary.

"Diplomatic cars" are held up often enough by the traffic cops, but that's all the good it does.

The driver simply produces his card and hands it haughtily to the policeman. The policeman takes one glance at the engraved crest on it, apologizes, salutes, and the juggernaut vanishes, 40 miles an hour, honking madly, with pedestrians scurrying for their lives and other machines clearing the way in twice the panic the fire department would create responding to a call to save the national Capitol from destruction.

AUTO PLANT AIDS IN
EDUCATING STUDENTS

Sidewalls of Casings
Should Be Guarded

Tires should be guarded from such abuses as come from scraping them against curbstones, running over rough and frozen roads or other road obstructions. The sidewall rubber is comparatively thin, so as to interfere as little as possible with flexing of the sidewall, and if the rubber coating is injured the fabric or the cord of the carcass is exposed, allowing moisture, sand, dirt and other substances to destroy the tire. Tires in this condition should be taken off as soon as possible and vulcanized.

A TIMELY TIP

To conserve excess draining on the battery, especially at night, switch off the lights when using the self-starter. Throw out the clutch to save the starter the trouble of cranking over the transmission gears, and pull the choker out before touching the starter button so as to make every movement of the starter's work count.

CAUSES OF OIL LEAKS

Fresh oil seen under a car after it has been standing indicates an oil leak. If this is not corrected more oil will be wasted than is used. Loose nuts on the oil pan, loose oil pipes or leaking in the front case usually causes the leaks.

FREE FROM CARBON

A mixture of 85 per cent kerosene and 15 per cent denatured alcohol, if used regularly, will keep the cylinders clean. Warm the engine and pour into each cylinder a few tablespoonfuls of the mixture. Turn the engine over a few times by hand and then allow to stand over night. The next morning start the engine in the usual manner.

The above method is not effective unless it is begun with a clean engine and repeated at frequent intervals, according to the condition of the engine.
