

Johnson Growing Popular in Defeat

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (U.N.)—Ban B. Johnson, like Jack Dempsey, is finding popularity in defeat.

Baseball fans throughout the country are recognizing Johnson's services to baseball, forgiving his outbursts against Judge Landis in concern over Johnson's physical and mental collapse.

At the same time clearing baseball skies, reveal white-haired old Judge Landis alone on Olympus. It is certain that during the Judge's tenure of office none other will rise to challenge his authority.

The manner in which the two major leagues now function, with their executive committees and advisory council, makes the office of president of little importance. John A. Heydler, president of the National league, realizes this and reads his annual reports good naturedly.

Frank Nevin, head of the Detroit club, who becomes acting president of the American league, probably realizes it also.

But Ban Johnson, who had fought baseball's battles in the '90's, and who brought the American league into being, never understood. Ban had been almost as much of a "car" as Judge Landis in his day, and even in his most lucid moments he chafed under the lash of the old judge's authority.

Baseball men admired Johnson as a fighter, just as boxing fans clung to their admiration for Jack Dempsey.

Now that Johnson has taken his licking—and the crowd bears with regret that he is practically an invalid, a sufferer from Bright's disease, diabetes and hardening of the arteries—well, it is a safe bet that if Ban shows up at a baseball park next summer he will be given a cordial reception from the fans.

Presumably Cobb and Speaker are ready to return to baseball. The excitement of the past month should enhance their drawing power if not their popularity.

Cobb-Speaker to Know Fate Today

CHICAGO, Jan. 24. (U.N.)—Judge Kenesaw M. Landis, high commissioner of baseball, announced today that he will make his decision in the Cobb-Speaker case, "some time this week."

He would not comment on the current report that Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker be reinstated and allowed to play organized baseball.

"My decision in this matter will be made some time this week," he said. "I don't care to say anything on the subject in advance of my decision."

It is the general opinion of experts that Cobb and Speaker will be exonerated of charges made by Hubert "Dutch" Leonard, that the Cleveland Indians "threw" a game to the Detroit Tigers on September 25, 1919, and that money was won as a result of the outcome.

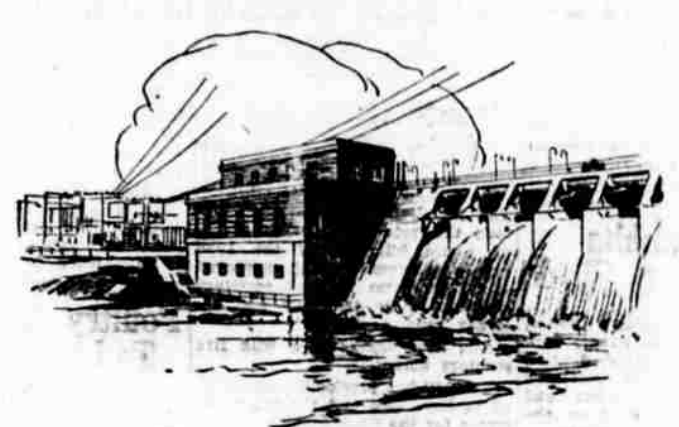
