It is a good thing for Klamath some sensible people know enough to soft-pedal things. The trend is altogether towards too much useless chatter, like so many windmills fanning or panning the air. In the final showdown any real accomplishment has to be credited to quiet, unassuming folk.

There is, possibly some use for the energy that maintains perpetual motion, but we are always fearful it may come a cropper by slipping on the sidewalk. The old-fashioned notion of a slow pace for a long race seems good enough these days to deserve a gold frame. It is something of an art, after all, to be the silent spectator.

SUSPICION

If you want some fun, start questioning someone's dollar for fear it is counterfeit. And if you're trying to make mischief, suggest to anyone that somebody is open to suspicion and the trick will be done. It ought not to be so easily possible, but many of us are still heathen at heart; we like nothing better than to get an occasional scalp.

Klamath's reputation will go farther and last longer if it sticks to its original program of being friendly. There can be reasonable acceptance of visitors and tourists without holding everyone open to question. Nobody has any use for a snarly town, or a suspicious town, or one that is overly-officious. We must learn to give and take in the spirit of fair play, and to allow for criticism that is constructive, regardless of how it hurts.

FACING THE MUSIC

The sooner we understand the importance of community credit the better it will be for our future as a county. New capital will not readily flock to a section which has a reputation of being poor pay. Klamath has been sailing pretty near the danger point with \$147,000 of old warrants in default, and no effort made to adjust. The special bond election next Tuesday is intended to meet the issue squarely, and wipe the slate clean.

A matter of this sort affects title to every home and every piece of property. It isn't something we can sidestep at will and dispose of at our pleasure. It means Klamath owes money for which no immediate cash is available, for warrants which are long past due. The only thing that can be done right now is to vote bonds as arranged, and take care of the indebtedness on

time payments. To do less is to parade ourselves as dead-beats. To announce to the world either that we can't pay or won't pay is to put the kibosh on any chance of our ever amounting to more than a mere frontier.

Senator Leedroot, Wisconsin, republican, "I think the one great mistake President Coolidge has made since he has been in the white house was his suggestion for a tax refund."

Charges that wealthy influences winned and dined government tax officials and then negotiated with them for refunds were revived by Senator Reed during the debate.

"These officials," he said, "are winned and dined and thereupon hearings are held and negotiations are carried on with these individuals."

"William Boyce Thompson, a prominent republican leader, was reported as entertaining a clerk, and when the two came out of the room Thompson's tax had been cut \$520,000."

"That sort of business is appalling. I have heard of other cases. In all of these large transactions there should be a safeguard interposed for money paid out in large sums."

Similar charges were made yesterday by Senator Couzens, Michigan, republican.

ation imposed by the state constitution.

"The facts recited in your letter indicated that your consolidated levy for 1927, on the rolls of 1926, in the amount of \$446,847.41, is safely within the constitutional restrictions. The limitation applies to the aggregate levy and not to the separate items that make up the levy."

"In case the levy in question exceeds the constitutional limitation, above referred to, only such part thereof which is in excess of the limitation is invalidated and this is specifically proved in the constitutional amendment which reads, in part as follows:

"... And any part of any levy of taxes made by the state or any county, municipality, or other taxing district or body which shall exceed the limitations fixed thereby shall be void."

Timber interests contesting the validity of cruising contracts, held that the new court could rescind the contracts because of alleged excess of the six per cent limitation brought about by the cruising expenditures.

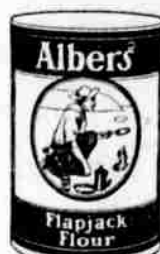

ment bill, the Klamath district will not protest the plan, for, it was pointed out, the law would then be ineffective here.

The wire forwarded to A. M. Collier, house representative from this district, advising that bill 42 be so drafted as to exclude the Klamath project, also approved house bill No. 44, but stated that difficulties would probably arise in local application of the bill.

Reason for this is because the constitution doesn't apply to benefit assessments, directors stated, declaring that unless the bill is changed in accordance with the attorney general's construction of the law as to provide for recall action, the bill would not be applicable.

sending of fleets and armies to China with a view to crushing this spirit through force.

"I am in favor of protecting our people. But I am in favor of protecting them at the present time if necessary by bringing them out of danger until all danger is passed. I would not embarrass or seem to impede China in her great struggle."

Borah said that China is entitled to be rid of the old treaties, extra territorial rights, and to enjoy the right to fix her own tariff rates.

"I venture to express the belief that she will achieve these things. If the nations do not assist, do not voluntarily aid, in bringing it about, we shall likely see the same thing accomplished through the decrees of the Chinese people," he predicted.

Borah did not comment on Secretary of State Kellogg's statement on China, except possibly to leave an inference by this remark:

"The United States should not hesitate to announce her own policy."

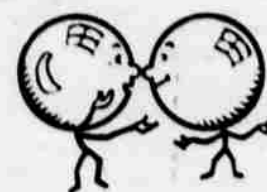
