

Gallant Old Celt Whips Berlenbach

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Jan. 28, (U.N.)—Mike McGigue, the gallant old Celt, who found a fountain of youth and a knockout wallop in his 39th year, knocked out Paul Berlenbach, erstwhile Astoria assassin, in the fourth round of their fight at Madison Square Garden Friday night before a capacity crowd.

Before he put away the highly touted Dutchman, McGigue administered one of the severest beatings ever handed out in a New York ring and Berlenbach was so terribly punished that at the finish Referee Kid McPartland stepped between Mike and his beaten foe and stopped the slaughter.

From the start to the finish of the bout it was all McGigue.

WILD HORSES WORK AS EXTRAS IN FILM

Over five hundred wild horses unwillingly acted as "extras" in Yakima Canutt's current photoplay sensation, "The Fighting Stallion", which will be shown at the Orpheus Theatre today.

Aged Financiers Reap Big Returns

NEW YORK, Jan. 28, (U.N.)—Two veterans of American finance, John D. Rockefeller and L. F. Loree, were credited tonight with the most sensational Wall street maneuver since the celebrated Northern Pacific "corner" of 1901.

Launching what appeared to be a determined battle for control of the Wheeling and Lake Erie railroad, presumably for the purpose of working a merger with other eastern railroad properties, these two aged financiers caught hundreds of bear traders in their trap and at the end of a day of wild trading had squeezed most of them out of the market with losses that may run into millions of dollars.

Shares jumped to a new high record of \$62 and closed at \$59, which was five points up for the day. Forty four thousand six hundred shares changed hands during the flurry.

Behind the scenes stood the shadows of Rockefeller and Loree, whose brokers had been buying Wheeling and Lake Erie stock for weeks forcing the market higher and higher by the insistent selling by the bears.
