Christian Science—The lesson of the Christian Science church for Sunday, January 30, is Love, according to the announcement made yesterday.

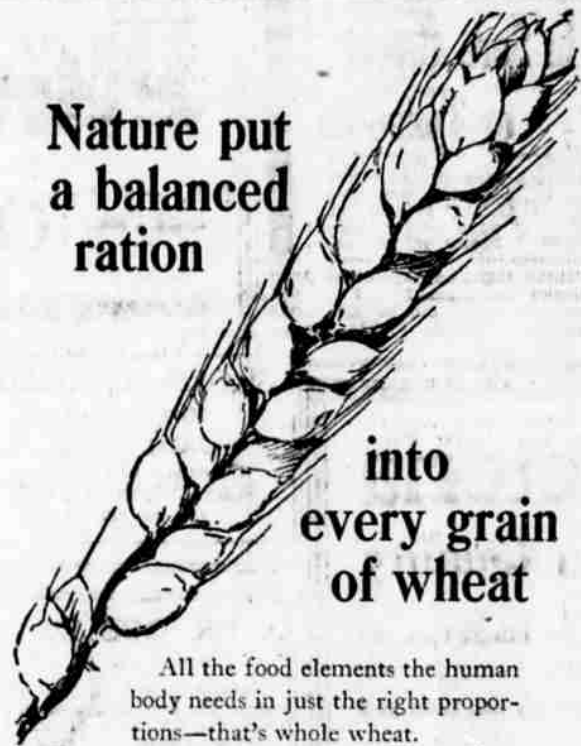
