Approximately \$2,500 will be expended for a new barn at Government Camp giving space for horses, wagons and machinery. A stone cabin will be built at a cost of \$1,000 for employees and will be the first of a number of 11.

All present buildings at Government Camp, with the exception of two, will be razed this year, Col. Thomson stated. It is planned to place all buildings at least 300 yards from the highways so that they cannot be seen by tourists, thus enhancing the natural beauty of the park.
