VALUABLE HELP TO MEMBERS OF BUSINESS CLUBS

Valuable work in helping the young business woman to select a vocation for herself which will give her scope for development and eventually for large remuneration will be attempted this year by the education committee of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs of which Miss Hester M. Smith of Denver, Colo., is chairman.

Hitherto much stress has been laid by the education committee on better education in preparation for business life, the slogan, "A High School Education for Every Business Girl," having been adopted by state federations all over the United States. In addition to this, high school girls have been urged to take special training, fitting them for the occupation they intend to select, and in many instances scholarships have been provided to help them take that training.

These fields will not be abandoned this year, but greater emphasis than ever before will be laid on vocational guidance.

The personal research committee of the National Federation, of which Miss Margaret Elliott of the University of Michigan is chairman, is conducting a nation-wide survey to determine what fields are most lucrative for women; what fields they have already made greatest progress, and what comparatively new fields beckon promisingly.

Through a close co-operation between the personal research committee and the education committee, the facts ascertained by this survey will at once be placed at the disposal of the education committee, which will then endeavor through its state and local committees to acquaint younger business women and older business women who desire to change their occupations with the possibilities of advancement which lie before them in each vocation.

Closely coupled with this will be a vocational guidance program designed to enable the young business women to study their own qualifications accurately and determine to what type of work they are best fitted.

The result of this twin endeavor is expected to be that women will be kept out of vocations already over-crowded, and that young business women will select vocations to which they are suited. A consistent pursuit of this program over a period of years is expected to result in great economic advantage.

COLLEGE MEN TO BE MOVIE HEROES SOON

American colleges may supply the movie heroes of the future. Declaring that the day of the Latin lover is past, the picture producers are looking to institutions of higher learning for the new faces demanded by the patrons of the silver screen.

Not that the motion picture makers want "collegiate" types. There is no crying need, either, for "pretty boys." Screen executives who are authority for the statement that college men make excellent movie actors believe that there is a general shortage of typical, pleasant American youths in pictures—the kind who ordinarily seek careers of law or medicine.

The financial rewards of a successful screen career are far above those available to young college men that they might expect in other lines of endeavor.

"In screen tests we must judge physical advantages and disadvantages, intelligence in responding to direction and flexibility as an actor, but the thing most wanted is character," said John McCormick, general manager of West Coast production for First National.

"College men, as a rule, have it. Clean, wholesome American manhood is the thing most valued in aspirants for screen fame. The future screen stars must be men who, in spirit at least, are the ideals they typify. The day of the screen poster is past. Their successors must be youths who must have brains, plus high adventure and a spirit of happiness and success, and must reflect the traits when photographed."
