

Good Weather is Assured Here by Padre of Rains

SANTA CLARA, Cal., Jan. 31. (U.N.)—February will be ushered in with rains in northern sections of the Pacific coast and sunshine from Eureka, Cal., southward, according to predictions for the month announced today by Father J. S. Ricard, famous "padre of the rains" of the University of Santa Clara.

The forecast for the remainder of February follows:

February 2—General rains and snow.

Feb. 3, 4, 5—The same storm enlarging. Beginning to clear on the fifth, except from Roseburg northward.

Feb. 6, 7—Generally fair.

Feb. 8—A new storm with rain from Marshfield to San Francisco.

Feb. 9—Fair over northwest and central California. Rain in Los Angeles.

Feb. 10—Fair in California. Rain in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Feb. 11—Fair in California, rain continuing in northwest.

Feb. 12—Rain advancing toward San Francisco.

Feb. 13—Rain advancing to Los Angeles, clearing in other parts.

Feb. 14—Fair from San Diego to southern Oregon. Rain northward.

Feb. 15—Rain from Roseburg to Prince Rupert; fair south to San Diego.

Feb. 16—Rain from North Head to Los Angeles.

Feb. 17—Fair from Roseburg north with rain south of Oregon.

Feb. 18—Fair except in southern California.

Feb. 19, 20—Clearing to fair.

Feb. 21—Fair northern and central. Rain in northwest and possibly in southern California.

Feb. 22—Fair from Portland to San Luis Obispo. Rain possibly in other sections.

Feb. 23—Fair from Eureka to San Diego but rain over northwest.

Feb. 24, 25—Fair from southern Oregon to Gulf of California, but rain from Eureka north to Alaska.

Feb. 26, 27—Fair from southern Oregon to Mexico, but rain from Eureka north and east past the Cascades.

Feb. 28—Rain from North Head to the northward, but fair from that section to San Diego.
