

Pelican Community Club Challenges Local Cardinals

The Pelican Community Club has issued a challenge to the Klamath Cardinals to play basketball, either one game to be played on any floor in the county, or a series of best two out of three games, one on each home floor and the deciding game on neutral floor. The following conditions to rule:

1—The players of both teams to consist of those now listed with the secretary of the Spud and Timber League, namely: Cardinals: Dean Beckley, Curly Swanson, Jess Bradley, Max Newcomb, Perry Babcock, Charles Grove, Delmar Robertson, Vernon Moore, Harry Molatore, Pete Motzenbacher, C. Stine and one other who was practicing with them prior to January 22nd.

2—The net proceeds of the game or games to be given any charity or charities to be named by Mayor Tom Watters.

3—All game officials to be men not connected in any way with either team and to be fully satisfactory to both teams. We suggest the refereeing and umpiring to be done by Mr. Heikens of Henley High School and Mr. Percy Murray of Klamath Falls.

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Rosenberg Loses Title by Weight

NEW YORK, Feb. 4, (U.N.)—Charlie (Phil) Rosenberg was deprived of the world's bantamweight championship by the New York state athletic commission Friday when he failed to make 118 pounds for his 15-round bout with Bushy Graham of Utica at Madison Square Garden.

Rosenberg, who has held the title since March 25, 1925, scaled 122½ pounds at 3 p. m., after having been warned by the commission that his title would be forfeited if he failed to make the bantam limit.

The deposed champion had been trying for several weeks to shed weight but found that he would have to weaken himself too greatly, and would have impaired his fighting ability if he had made 118 pounds.

Being now a natural featherweight and intending to retire after the bout under any circumstances, Rosenberg chose to forfeit his bantam title and come in strong at 122½ pounds, hoping to defeat Graham and win for his friends the bets they had placed upon him.

Graham weighed 117½ pounds. The understanding was that if Graham won he would be recognized as champion by the New York state athletic commission, but in case of a Rosenberg victory the title would be declared vacant.

Rosenberg's failure to make 118 pounds cost him \$2,500, half of which went to Graham and half to Madison Square Garden. The Rosenberg incident represents the first time in boxing history that a world's champion has been automatically deprived of his title for failing to make the weight of his class.
