Because of a school rule the faces before the speaker were guileless of make-up. They reflected no sympathy in viewpoint, however.

"How sweet and clean you all look in contrast to the way some of you look on the street," began the actress before turning to a review of her use of make-up on the stage, and how even then she had used less "than I see every day on girls who ought to know better."

School officials said that some girls kept cosmetics in their lockers and applied them just before leaving for their homes. They agreed with Mrs. Creel that parents ought to teach their daughters to avoid paint and powders to an excessive degree.

Mrs. Creel's 13-year old daughter, Frances Virginia, by asking her mother for some rouge, was responsible for the actress' crusade.
